1	ORDINANCE NO. 210626	
2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9 10 11 12	An ordinance of the City of Gainesville, Florida, amending the Code of Ordinances by creating Division 7, titled "Food Diversion" within Article III of Chapter 27; requiring certain food oriented commercial establishments to follow a food waste diversion hierarchy; providing for general penalties in section 1-9, injunctive relief, and code enforcement; providing directions to the codifier; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing clause; and providing an effective date and an enforcement date.	
13 14	WHEREAS, the City Commission finds that it is desirable to require certain commercial	
15	generators who provide food for consumption to divert food and food waste to beneficial uses,	
16	including feeding hungry people, feeding animals, industrial uses, and composting; and	
17	WHEREAS, the City Commission finds that this Ordinance is necessary to achieve food	
18	waste reduction, reduce methane in landfills, and increase composting; and	
19	WHEREAS, at least ten (10) days' notice has been given once by publication in a	
20	newspaper of general circulation notifying the public of this proposed ordinance and of public	
21	hearings in the City Hall Auditorium located on the first floor of City Hall in the City of	
22	Gainesville; and	
23	WHEREAS, public hearings were held pursuant to the notice described above at which	
24	hearings the parties in interest and all others had an opportunity to be and were, in fact, heard.	
25	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE	
26	CITY OF GAINESVILLE, FLORIDA:	
27	Section 1. The Code of Ordinance of Gainesville, Florida is hereby amended by adding	
28	a Division 7 within Article III of Chapter 27, which division reads as follows. Except as	
29	amended herein, the remainder of Chapter 27 remains in full force and effect.	
30	DIVISION 7. – FOOD DIVERSION	

Sec. 27-95.4 - Mandatory commercial food waste diversion established.		
(a) Beginning on the dates listed below, the following commercial generators shall divert		
food or food waste from the waste stream unless they are granted an exemption:		
(1) By January 1, 2023, food retailers that occupy at least 25,000 square feet, including		
but not limited to grocery stores, convenience stores, meat markets, poultry		
markets, fish and related aquatic food markets, and produce markets.		
(2) By January 1, 2024, food service establishments that occupy at least 4,500 square		
feet, businesses with a commercial kitchen(s) where the kitchen(s) occupies at lea		
1,000 square feet, businesses engaged in selling food to other businesses, food		
manufacturers (excluding food service establishments) engaged in processing or		
fabricating food products from raw materials for sale directly to the public, retailed		
or wholesalers.		
Commercial generators which are required to divert food or food waste under this		
subsection shall divert food or food waste in accordance with the following hierarchy, listed in		
order of priority:		
(1) feeding hungry people;		
(2) feeding animals;		
(3) providing for industrial uses;		
(4) composting.		
(b) Proof of participation in food waste diversion program. Upon request of the city		
manager or designee, a commercial generator required to divert food or food waste shall provide		
the following as proof of compliance: 1) receipts for delivery of food to a food bank or other		
facility that provides food to hungry people or animals, or 2) receipts for delivery of food wast		

55	to a food waste processing facility that meets permitting requirements of the State of Florida, or
56	produce proof of a valid and current contract with a food waste registrant.
57	(c) Exemptions. A commercial generator may request an exemption from the requirements
58	of this section. The city manager or designee shall grant a request for an exemption if the
59	commercial generator demonstrates that it is unable to comply due to lack of available service
50	providers or facilities that accept food or food waste. An exemption request must be completed
51	every 6 months and submitted using forms provided by the city. Commercial generators shall
52	be notified in writing within sixty (60) days of whether their exemption request is granted or
53	denied.
54	Sec. 27-95.5 Penalties for violation.
55	Unless specifically stated otherwise, the city shall enforce violations of sections 27-95.4 through
56	code enforcement proceedings, by section 1-9 of this Code of Ordinances, or seek injunctive
57	relief in a court of competent jurisdiction.
58	Section 2. It is the intention of the City Commission that the provisions of Section 1 of this
59	Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of
70	Gainesville, Florida, and that the sections and paragraphs of this Ordinance may be renumbered
71	or relettered in order to accomplish such intentions.
72	Section 3. If any word, phrase, clause, paragraph, section or provision of this ordinance
73	or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, such
74	finding shall not affect the other provisions or application of the ordinance which can be given

effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provisions or application, and to this end the

provisions of this ordinance are declared severable.

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77	Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances, in conflict herewith are to the extent of	
78	such conflict hereby repealed.	
79	Section 5. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon adoption.
