- Able to Address the Two Main Issues with Composting: Contamination and Markets
- Works with Customers to Avoid Contamination and has High Demand for Compost

Community Composters



- Community Composters are Found throughout the Country
- They serve Rural and Urban Areas
- Contribute to the Local Circular Economy
- Generally, Work Outside of Municipal Programs
- For Residential Customers, Cost as Much as Garbage Service

- Neighbor Pays One Time \$50 Fee to Show Commitment to Program
- Grant Provides Bucket for Collection, Inside Home Container, Education, and Monitoring of Success
- Neighbor Receives Clean Bucket in Exchange Each Week
- Working Food will Assist with Marketing Materials including Tips on Food Reduction and Incorporation of Program in Their Education
- Grow Hub to Provide Land and Equipment as Necessary

Goals of Grant

- Increase Compost Sales by Beaten Path
- Maintain Participation Levels at 95%
- Keep Contamination Levels at Less than 2%
- Determine if Increased Density Can Reduce Costs of Service
- Determine if Multiple Community Composters
 Could Provide Service to Gainesville and Other
 Similarly Sized Communities
