



Applause is Due

- As of May 2006, only 200 communities in the US had committed to planning initiatives to end homelessness.
- Less than one year ago, Gainesville produced its 10-Year Plan to End Homelessness (GRACE).
- The process involved over 200 people, including representatives from a wide variety of public and private sectors.



Accomplishments

- The 10-Year plan outlined numerous short-, mid- and long-term goals
- Approved less than a year ago, many goals have been initiated and/or implemented:
 - o Increase public awareness
 - Create an Office On Homelessness
 - Seek funding for homeless programs
 - Implement the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)



Derailment Ahead?

- Polarization around the appropriate response to legitimate concerns of residents, business owners, providers and advocates.
- Smallest but most visible and difficult homeless population driving attitudes about homelessness.
- Fear and frustration have caused some providers, residents and business owners to disengage from the process.



Re-establishing Consensus

- Security-Services Team
- One-Stop Day Center
- Review, revision and/or consistent enforcement of ordinances
- Begin discussions with downtown service providers to encourage use of One-Stop Day Center



Security-Services Team

- Best Practice recommended in GRACE
- Uniformed daytime patrol on foot or bike for Downtown Area
- Link patrol with social service worker to provide assistance to homeless persons
- Include access to funding for transportation (Homeward Bound)



One-Stop Day Center

- 2006-07 Goal in GRACE
- RFP to require collaborative response to ensure maximum participation and coordination of service providers.
- Services to include:
 - -Outreach
 - -Centralized intake and case management
 - -Employment training/placement
 - -Food Distribution if permitted
 - -Daily needs



One-Stop Day Center

- Site may be proposed by collaborative but not required and not part of scoring
 - Allows focus on service delivery
 - Encourages greater participation by providers
- One-Stop Day Center must
 - Be located outside downtown area
 - Comply with zoning requirements
 - Be located in close proximity to RTS
 - Provide an attractive, positive environment



Review of Ordinances

- Review ordinances and current enforcement related to food distribution, panhandling, etc.
- Review land use/zoning categories and provision of social services, food distribution and shelter/housing.
- Concurrent with opening of One-Stop Day Center, adopt recommendations.



Downtown Services

- Work with downtown service providers to discuss phased re-alignment of social services to encourage use of One-Stop Day Center by clients and providers.
- Duplication of One-Stop Day Center services can be avoided and gaps in services can be addressed.



The Long-Term Plan

- Continue implementation of GRACE with Office On Homelessness.
- Develop a Campus Master Plan that includes One-Stop Day Center with expanded services that include programs to prevent homelessness.
- Include Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing in Master Plan.
- Work with partners to pursue funding for Campus Master Plan.



Action Requested

Approve presentation concepts:

- 1. Authorize staff to develop a Security-Services Team proposal, including funding options.
- 2. Authorize the City Attorney to work with staff to review ordinances and land use/zoning categories and bring recommendations.
- 3. Work with downtown service agencies to discuss ways to re-align services to emphasize use of One-Stop Day Center.
