RE:

Sign Enforcement Related To Automotive Sales Establishments

The revision to the sign ordinance recently passed by the Commission provides some changes to temporary signs that will impact automotive sales lots. The changes provide opportunities for such establishments to place a limited amount of temporary signage on their lots providing they first obtain a Special Event Permit from the Code Enforcement Division.

Staff and I have met with Planning Manager, Ralph Hilliard to discuss these changes and have agreed to provide the following service to this industry:

- The Planning Division is creating a brochure which will provide photographic examples of permitted and non-permitted signs.
- The brochure will provide information on how to apply for a Special Event Permit, the frequency of such permits may be obtained and examples of signage approved during the timeframe of the permit.
- The Code Enforcement Division is initiating a business-by-business contact to meet with key representatives of the sales lots to deliver brochures, answer questions and provide information on what future enforcement can be anticipated

We are hopeful this approach will result in wide spread compliance. Should compliance not be achieved, officers will work to bring violators into compliance as enforcement priorities permit.

Re: Equity of sign enforcement


At your July 30, 2007, meeting you directed staff to report the level of sign enforcement in various parts of the City. Since many of the sign cases addressed by the Code Enforcement Division deal with temporary signs on public right of way it is not possible to state specifically whose sign was remove or exactly where the sign was located. We are able to report that during the last year 1851 sign cases were addressed. Many of these cases reflect multiple signs removed from a single location and therefore the actual number of signs removed is understated to some degree but that would be common to every area and 1851 proportionately is a sound number.

A query of this data reveals the numbers of cases addressed by the "neighborhood assignment" referenced in the attached map are as follows:

Worth noting is the area were automotive sales occur is one of the least enforced areas of the City Comparatively, this area receives about 5 5% of all sign enforcement and represents about 14 3% of the enforcement area
