Ordinance No. 0-07-74

An ordinance of the City of Gainesville amending Chapter 13, Article II. Housing Code of the City of Gainesville, relating to energy efficiency requirements; amending Section 13-16 to provide findings of fact and declaration of necessity; amending Section 13-19 to provide definition(s); adding Section 13-99 energy efficiency requirements; providing for enforcement; providing directions to the codifier; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing clause; and, providing an effective date in

accordance with the schedule provided herein.

Recommendation: The City Commission adopt the proposed ordinance.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT STAFF REPORT

The City Commission referred the issue of energy efficiency standards and requirements to the Community Development Committee on December 12, 2005 as part of the report made by the Affordable Housing Coalition. On June 1, 2006, GRU staff presented a list of potential energy efficiency and conservation standards be incorporated into the Housing Code. The City's Minimum Housing Code applies to every building used or intended to be used as a dwelling. If the City chooses to incorporate energy efficiency standards, all new and existing occupied dwellings (tenant occupied and owner occupied) will be required to comply.

The Community Development Committee members and staff investigated a variety of options and have concluded that issues of the building envelope are the most common problem with ensuring energy efficiency of residential structures. In 2006, GRU conducted a survey of low-income homes which showed that 89% of homes surveyed had inadequate levels of insulation in the attic. Adding insulation will reduce the amount of heat loss and reduce the energy needed to maintain a comfortable temperature. It was determined that the requirement for R-19 insulation in the attic of residential structures was an effective method to improve energy efficiency. GRU offers a rebate to defer the cost of R-19 insulation and a low interest loan for energy efficient improvements in owner-occupied homes. The City Commission directed that incorporation of R-19 insulation into the Housing Code should be completed after the low interest loan is available. The low interest loan became available in July 2007.

This ordinance provides owners of dwellings a one-year period to come into compliance prior to beginning enforcement. GRU will conduct training for City Code Enforcement staff before enforcement begins, if necessary. Code Enforcement will continue checking structures for Minimum Housing Code compliance at the current enforcement level, adding the R-19 insulation requirement to all inspections.

On July 23, 2007, the City Commission by a vote of 5-0 directed the City Attorney to draft and the Clerk of the Commission to advertise an ordinance to incorporate R-19 insulation in the attic as a Minimum Housing Code requirement.

FISCAL NOTE

No additional code enforcement officers are proposed at this time. Enforcement of this standard will be incorporated into existing Minimum Housing Code inspection procedures. Funding for the code enforcement training, R-19 insulation rebate and the low interest loan are included in the GRU budget.

CITY ATTORNEY MEMORANDUM

This ordinance requires two public hearings. If the ordinance passes on the first reading, second and final reading will be held on February 11, 2008.

ORDINANCE NO. __ 1 4 An ordinance of the City of Gainesville amending Chapter 13, Article II. Housing Code of the City of Gainesville, relating to 5 energy efficiency requirements; amending Section 13-16 to provide 6 findings of fact and declaration of necessity; amending Section 13-7 19 to provide definition(s); adding Section 13-99 energy efficiency 8 requirements; providing for enforcement; providing directions to 9 the codifier; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing 10 11 clause; and, providing an effective date in accordance with the 12 schedule provided herein. 13 14 WHEREAS, the City of Gainesville through Gainesville Regional Utilities (GRU) is the provider of electric power and natural gas for heating to residents within the City limits and in the GRU 15 service of Alachua County, and as such has a significant and legitimate governmental interest in 16 17 mandating energy efficiency; and WHEREAS, the Gainesville City Commission requested that GRU staff develop programs to 18 achieve maximum energy efficiency to help reduce residents energy consumption; and 19 WHEREAS, GRU conducted a survey of low income homes in 2006 to determine, among 20 other things, the primary causes of energy inefficiency in residential dwellings in low income census 21 22 areas; and WHEREAS, the 2006 GRU survey results indicated that 89% of homes sampled had 23 24 inadequate levels of insulation; and: WHEREAS, the GRU survey indicated that 65.6% of respondents homes were constructed 25

more than 20 years ago and industry data indicates effectiveness of attic insulation deteriorates after 20

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years; and

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1	WHEREAS, the Florida Building Code energy efficiency standards have required a minimum
2	of R-19 insulation in the attic for new residential construction since 1980; and
3	WHEREAS, GRU data indicates that 56% of an average GRU residential customer bill is used
4	for space heating and cooling costs; and
. 5	WHEREAS, adding adequate insulation is a significant measure that reduces heating and
6	cooling costs, to help postpone the need for additional generating capacity, and to limit
· 7	contributions of pollutants in the atmosphere; and
8	WHEREAS, the Community Development Committee, a standing committee of the
9	Gainesville City Commission considered the survey and industry data presented and received a report
10	from the Alachua County Affordable Housing Commission, outlining recommendations for improving
11	energy efficiency in housing stock, and after deliberation and public input, recommended the
12	establishment of minimum standards for attic insulation in all occupied residential dwellings; and
. 13	WHEREAS, at least ten (10) days notice prior to adoption has been given once by publication
14	in a newspaper of general circulation notifying the public of this proposed ordinance and of the Public
15	Hearings in the City Commission Auditorium in City Hall, City of Gainesville; and
16	WHEREAS, the Public Hearings were held pursuant to the published notices described
17	above at which hearings in the parties in interest and all others had an opportunity to be and were,
18	in fact, heard.
19	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE
20	CITY OF GAINESVILLE, FLORIDA:
21	Section 1. The aforementioned findings are adopted by the City Commission of the City of

- 2 Section 2. Section 13-16 of the City of Gainesville Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read
- 3 as follows:
- 4 Sec. 13-16. Findings of fact and declaration of necessity.
- 5 The city commission finds the following:
- (1) Existence of conditions. Premises exist within the city containing blighted dwellings or other 6 7 structures intended for human habitation, and such dwellings or other structures are blighted because of faulty design or construction or failure to keep them in a proper state of repair or lack 8 of proper sanitary facilities or lack of adequate heat, insulation, light or ventilation, or improper 9 management or any combination of these factors as a result of which such buildings or 10 11 structures have become deteriorated, dilapidated, neglected, energy inefficient, overcrowded with occupants or unsanitary as to be unfit for human habitation, thereby imperiling the health, 12 safety or welfare of the occupants thereof or the inhabitants of the surrounding area. 13
- (2) Results if conditions uncorrected. Such blighted premises, dwellings and other blighted 14 buildings or other structures contribute to the development of, or increase in, disease, infant 15 mortality, crime and juvenile delinquency; conditions existing on such blighted premises cause 16 a drain upon public revenue and impair the efficient and economical exercise of governmental 17 18 functions in such areas; and conditions existing on such blighted premises necessitate excessive and disproportionate expenditure of public funds for public health, public safety, crime 19 prevention, fire protection, environmental mitigation for energy production, energy generation 20 or purchase, and other public services. 21

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1	(3)	Necessity to protect public health, safety and welfare. The enactment of this chapter is
2		necessary to protect the public health, safety and welfare of the people of the city by establishing
3		minimum standards governing the facilities, utilities, occupancy, repair and maintenance of
4		buildings and grounds used for human habitation. This chapter is declared to be remedial and
5		essential to the public interest and welfare, and to this extent it is intended that this housing
6		code be liberally construed to effectuate the purposes stated herein.

- Section 3. Section 13-19 of the City of Gainesville Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to add
 the following definition to the list of definitions:
- 9 <u>R-19 insulation</u> shall mean home insulation material labeled by the manufacturer, in

 10 <u>accordance with federal law, as having a thermal resistance rating (an R-value) of R-19.</u>
- Section 4. Chapter 13, Article II. Housing Code, of the City of Gainesville Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to add a new Section 13-99. Energy Efficiency Requirements, to read as follows:
 - Sec. 13-99. Energy Efficiency Requirements.

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- (a) Attic Insulation. All accessible attic areas over the heated or cooled space of an occupied dwelling shall contain a minimum of R-19 insulation. The R-19 insulation shall be installed in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions. Eave vents in the attic shall not be blocked as a result of installation of the R-19 insulation. Where the ceiling structure will not support the weight of R-19 insulation, the owner may provide a written statement attesting to same to the enforcing official and upon inspection and verification by the enforcing official, the R-19 insulation requirement shall be deemed impracticable and shall be waived by the enforcing official.
 - (b) Violation of the R-19 insulation requirement shall be considered a minor violation.

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1	Section 5. It is the intention of the City Commission that the provisions of Sections 2, 3, and 4 of
2	this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of
. 3	Gainesville, Florida, and that the Sections and Paragraphs of this Ordinance may be renumbered or
4	relettered in order to accomplish such intentions.
5	Section 6. All ordinances in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.
6	Section 7. If any word, phrase, clause, paragraph, section or provision of this ordinance or the
7	application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, such finding shal
8	not affect the other provisions or applications of the ordinance which can be given effect without the
. 9	invalid or unconstitutional provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance
10	are declared severable.
11	Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect upon adoption; however, owners of all affected dwellings
12	will have one calendar year to come into compliance and therefore notices of violation of this
13	ordinance will not be issued until after 12:01 A.M. on February 12, 2009.
