Institute for Workforce Innovation Donation for Banks-Cosby Building Renovation (B)

Acceptance of a donation valued in an amount up to \$120,000 from the Institute for Workforce Innovation (IWI) to be used toward the cost of renovations of the Banks-Cosby Building located at 635 NW 6th Street, Gainesville, FL.

Explanation: This item requests that the City Commission accept a donation valued in an amount up to \$120,000 from the Institute for Workforce Innovation (IWI) to be used toward the cost of renovations of the City-owned Banks-Cosby Building located at 635 NW 6th Street, Gainesville, FL.

> The City purchased and owns the Banks-Cosby Building located at 635 NW 6th Street, Gainesville, FL, which was purchased with funds from the United States Department of Justice, Asset Forfeiture and Money Laundering, Equitable Share Program (Federal Forfeiture) funds in July 2007.

Pursuant to the Federal Forfeiture Program and the United States Department of Justice policies, the Gainesville Police Department (GPD) must utilize the Banks-Cosby building for law enforcement purposes and community based programs, including, drug crime prevention, gang education and awareness, housing and job skills programs; and may not lease the building.

As outlined in the July 19, 2016 agreement between the IWI and the City of Gainesville, IWI has pledged to make contributions valued up to \$120,000 for the cost of construction/renovation work of the Banks-Cosby Youth Empowerment Center. The \$120,000 pledge will be comprised of labor provided by Project Youth Build students, donated materials, and in-kind services provided by trade professionals, along with cash payments.

IWI's Project Youth Build is an intensive 7-month academic, occupational, and leadership skills program that serves young people ages 16-24 with low incomes who have dropped out of school. While in Project Youth Build, students participate in an innovative alternative education program that provides individualized instruction as they work towards earning their high school diploma, earn multiple nationally recognized construction credentials, participate in a rigorous leadership development program, volunteer in their community, and rehabilitate affordable housing. Project Youth Build is an AmeriCorps program. Students that complete 450 impact hours through volunteerism earn a Seagle Education Award valued at \$1,500 to be used towards post-secondary education.

IWI desires to collaborate with the City to strengthen its impact with local youth by having eligible students in the Project Youth Build program participate in the GPD's B.O.L.D. programs and other GPD initiatives, and to renovate the Banks-Cosby Building as a Project Youth Build project.

Banks-Cosby Building Obligations per the July 19, 2016 agreement:

- 1. City of Gainesville: The City agrees to enter into a construction contract with a licensed Florida General Contractor to perform the renovation work of the Banks-Cosby Building. The City has committed the use of unobligated fund balance from the GPD Federal Law Enforcement Contraband Forfeiture Trust Fund in the amount of \$120,000 toward the renovation costs. These funds have already been transferred to the appropriate project construction account.
- 2. IWI: IWI agrees to contribute up to \$120,000 of value and cash payments toward the renovation costs of the Banks-Cosby Building. IWI will coordinate with the General Contractor to provide student labor, construction materials, and contracted construction work.
- 3. IWI will be allowed to utilize the Banks Building for the dual enrolled students from Project Youth Build and other youth programs in partnership with the GPD.

Fiscal Note: On December 17, 2015 in agenda item #150602, the City Commission

approved appropriating \$120,000 from the Federal Law Enforcement Contraband Forfeiture Trust Fund to bring the Banks Building back into compliance working with the Institute for Workforce Innovation and Project YouthBuild.

The Institute for Workforce Innovation is proposing contributing half of the total project costs, up to \$120,000 in cash and in kind services towards this project. The preliminary estimated cost, including an appropriate contingency, for renovation of this building is \$225,214, which is less than the maximum funding of \$240,000 between the City's share and IWI's share.

Construction is scheduled to begin in June, 2017 and be completed in 12-16 weeks.

RECOMMENDATION

The City Commission approve and accept a mix of cash and in kind donations valued in an amount up to \$120,000 from the Institute for Workforce Innovation to be used toward the cost of renovations of the Banks-Cosby Building located at 635 NW 6th Street, Gainesville, FL.

Contract Amendment for Grounds Maintenance Services at **GRU Facilities (NB)**

This item was heard by the UAB on April 19, 2017

Explanation: Grounds maintenance services are required at various GRU facilities. Since these facilities are located adjacent to or in commercial, public or residential areas, it is essential to properly maintain them for aesthetic and safety reasons. Grounds maintenance services include mowing, shrub and tree pruning, edging, string line trimming, hand weeding and maintaining flower beds, as well as other related services in accordance with each facility's specific requirements.

> In an effort to create more opportunities for small business, GRU strives to establish multiple contracts to small businesses rather than awarding a single contract for all facilities. After an Invitation to Bid was issued in 2016, GRU awarded contracts to three small businesses for grounds maintenance services. The bid was sent to over forty grounds maintenance companies and was posted on the GRU website. Fifteen companies attended a mandatory pre-bid meeting and walk-through. A total of eight responses were received after two withdrew their bid. Since each contract's value was below \$50,000, City Commission approval was not required.

After the contracts commenced, the company that had been awarded the contract for the GRU Administration Building and electric substations determined that they could not perform the work as required and the parties mutually agreed to terminate the contract. GRU awarded the work for those sites to the next lowest bidder who already had a contract for other facilities. An amendment was issued to add those facilities to the contract and the work has been performed well.

With the addition of the GRU Administration Building and electric substations, the contract with Gainesville Lawnscaping LLC will be \$52,094 annually; therefore, staff is seeking authorization for the contract amendment and the continuation of the contract for three one-year extensions. An additional \$10,000 is included in the approval amount to cover additional work not in the scope of the contract such as replacing mulch, new plantings or other related work as required. Requested price increases are limited to the Consumer's Price Index (CPI) for each year of the contract, although Gainesville Lawnscaping LLC has not requested a price increase for the first available extension.

Fiscal Note: Funds are available in the FY 2017 budget and will be requested in subsequent year budgets.

RECOMMENDATION

The City Commission: 1) authorize the General Manager, or his designee, to execute three (3) one year amendments with Gainesville Lawnscaping LLC for grounds maintenance services for the Kelly Plant, Sweetwater Testing Area, GRUCom Building, Administration Building and Electric Substations, subject to the approval of the City Attorney as to form and legality; and 2) approve the issuance of purchase orders to Gainesville Lawnscaping LLC in amounts not exceeding \$62,000 for each year of the contract amendment pending final appropriation of funds for each fiscal year.

At their April 19, 2017 meeting, the UAB voted 6-0, with member Walpole absent, to recommend approval of staff's recommendation.

160920. General Architectural, Engineering and Consultation Services (B)

This item was presented to the UAB on April 19, 2017.

Explanation: On November 6, 2014, the City Commission authorized the CRA, City (Public Works and Facilities), and GRU to initiate contract negotiations with qualified architectural, engineering and consultation firms as a result of a request of a Request for Statement of Qualifications (RFSQ) for those services, issued for the first time as a joint effort. The resultant

continuing contracts comply with Consultant's Competitive Negotiation Act (CCNA) and provide staff augmentation when internal resources are already being fully utilized, the internal technical capabilities are not available, or third party input is desired from professionals in various disciplines.

The initial three-year contract term, which concludes September 30, 2017, may be extended for two additional one-year periods. Labor rates may be adjusted annually, based in part on the CPI, with the concurrence of the CRA, City, and GRU. Over half of the awarded firms are small, minority-owned or woman-owned businesses. The list of firms eligible for renewal is attached and includes a notation for the business classification.

As with all requirements for these professional services, the CRA, City, and GRU will award work to a firm on a project specific basis, and will award each project based upon an evaluation of a firm's understanding of the project scope, specific expertise and ability to complete the project, as well as the project completion time and cost. For projects with a cost estimated to exceed two million dollars, or when it is deemed to be in the best interest of the CRA, City, or GRU, a separate RFSQ will be issued requesting project specific submittals from the list of qualified professionals with the ranking submitted to the City Commission for approval.

Staff anticipates issuing a new RFSQ for continuing contracts during Fiscal Year 2018 to also allow participation of other interested firms.

Fiscal Note: Funding for the projects for which design or consultation services are required have been budgeted in the Capital Improvements Budgets of the CRA, City, and GRU departments requiring these services for FY 2018 and will be budgeted in future years as required.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u> Staff

- 1) approve the listing of qualified architectural, engineering and consultation firms eligible to renew agreements for the provision of design, engineering or consultation services associated with the CRA, City, and GRU facilities and City Commission approved Capital Improvement Projects or other projects that may emerge;
- 2) authorize the CRA Executive Director, City Manager and General Manager, or their designees, to negotiate renewals with the qualified firms in accordance with the provisions of CCNA for each of the remaining extensions;
- 3) authorize the CRA Executive Director, City Manager and General Manager, or their designees, upon successful negotiations, to execute renewal amendments for professional

services for each of the successive one-year terms, subject to approval of the City Attorney as to form and legality, in an amount not to exceed budgeted amounts for professional architectural, engineering or consultation services.

At their April 19, 2017 meeting, the Utility Advisory Board voted 4-0, with member Walpole absent and member Alford recusing herself, to recommend that the Commission approve staff's recommendation.

Administrative challenge by Alachua County to Comprehensive Plan
Amendments adopted by City of Gainesville Ordinance No. 160398 (B)

Explanation: On April 3, 2017, Alachua County filed a Petition for Formal Administrative Hearing to Challenge Comprehensive Plan Amendment alleging that the City's Future Land Use amendments adopted by Ordinance No. 160398 on March 2, 2016 are not "in compliance" under Section 163.3184, Florida Statutes. Ordinance No. 160398 placed City land use categories on property generally located between the 1300-1800 block of Tower Road (75th Street) and the 1800 block of S.W. 20th Avenue that was annexed into the City on June 16, 2016. The essence of the County's challenge is that the City did not adequately consider and account for the transportation impacts of the land use changes, particularly upon the County's transportation system.

At the April 6, 2017 City Commission meeting, the City Attorney advised the Commission that her Office would represent the City in-house and would timely file a demand for informal mediation in accordance with the statutory process. Because the underlying issue (transportation impacts) in this challenge is largely the same issue in dispute in the County's recent challenge to the City's Finley Woods annexation, City staff and County staff are meeting to discuss and address the underlying issue in an effort to resolve both pending challenges and avoid future

disputes concerning the same issue.

If a tentative resolution is reached, the matter will be brought before the City Commission and the County Commission for approval in accordance with the statutory procedure regarding settlement of challenges to comprehensive plan amendments. If a settlement is not reached, the parties will schedule a formal administrative hearing and proceed to conduct discovery and prepare for administrative litigation.

Lot #10 Status Report (B)

This is a request for the City Commission to hear a status report on Lot #10.

Explanation: On March 16, 2017, staff provided an inter-office communication to the City Commission indicating that despite City Commission direction provided on February 2, 2017 to pursue a First Amendment to the Amended and Restated Contract for Sale and Purchase of Lot #10 with Horizon Hospitality Management, Inc., and a Second Amendment to License Cancellation and Termination Agreement with MCG Parking, LLC, neither had been executed.

> MCG Parking, LLC had proposed a modification to the Second Amendment to License Cancellation and Termination Agreement that would have resulted in the reinstitution of entitlements to City parking garage spaces and, as reported to the Commission, this was not consistent with the Commission's former position of maintaining a publicly accessible inventory of spaces and created some concern regarding the public/private distribution of spaces and the status of tax-exempt bond financing outstanding.

Consequently, management was not prepared to move forward with the proposed modification.

As a result of the Second Amendment not being pursued, Horizon Hospitality Management, Inc., indicated, based upon the advice of counsel, that they would not be prepared to execute the First Amendment to the Amendment and Restated Contract for Sale and Purchase.

Currently, the Amended and Restated Contract for Sale and Purchase, executed on October 28, 2016, with Horizon Hospitality Management, Inc., and the First Amendment to License Cancellation and Termination, executed on November 7, 2016, with MCG Parking, LLC inclusive of all terms and dates is in effect. This status was communicated to all parties on March 16, 2017.

On April 12th, staff had a phone conversation with Horizon Hospitality Management Inc., representatives regarding status and on April 19th an e-mail communication was received by staff from representatives of MCG Parking, LLC indicating that they would require their parking entitlement for future development purposes.

Fiscal Note: At this juncture, the original deposit of \$25,000 is subject to being retained as per the Amended and Restated Contract for Sale and Purchase. An additional deposit of \$25,000 was due from Horizon Hospitality Management, Inc., on February 1, 2017 under the terms of the Amended and Restated Contract for Sale and Purchase which was not received. The next deposit is due on June 1, 2017.

This item requests that the City Commission receive a presentation and adopt the recommendations of the Citizen Committee for Implementing the Strategic Framework.

Explanation: On December 15, 2016, the City Commission adopted the Strategic

Plan Framework, a lasting blueprint to guide us towards our best Gainesville, a New American City. Vital to a successful implementation of the Framework is the continued engagement of citizens and community stakeholders.

On February 16, 2017, the Commission adopted a Resolution establishing a citizen advisory committee to assess and prioritize the community's more than 450 big ideas generated during the Gainesville Creative Series over several months throughout 2016 and early 2017. The committee consisted of fourteen (14) citizen members appointed by the City Commission, participated in seven (7) staff-facilitated workshops, and worked diligently over sixty (60) days. The City Commission directed the committee to identify 12-15 big ideas which would further support implementing the Strategic Plan Framework.

Public Hearing and Resolution for the Regional Transit System (RTS) Program of Projects (POP) FY 2017 (B)

This item is a request to accept comments at a Public Hearing on the Regional Transit System Program of Projects (POP) FY 2017, and adopt a Resolution authorizing the filing of grant applications with the Federal Transit Administration and Florida Department of Transportation.

Explanation: In order to remain eligible for federal and state funding, the Regional Transit System (RTS) is required annually to submit a Program of Projects (POP) to the Federal Transit Administration and a budget application for capital and operating projects to the Florida Department of Transportation. The application processes require notice to the public to provide opportunity for comment and input. The POP was presented to the RTS Advisory Board on March 22, 2017, and was published in the Gainesville Sun on April 26, 2017 and the Gainesville Guardian on April 27, 2017. Citizens will also be able to comment during the public hearing at the City Commission meeting. RTS ensures that the final POP

incorporates modifications based on input during the public comment opportunities.

Fiscal Note: The revenue for the Program of Projects of \$6,465,621 is included in the Transportation Improvement Program approved by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization.

AMENDMENT OF FIRE PROTECTION AND PREVENTION CODE PROVISIONS RELATING TO FALSE FIRE ALARMS TO **COMPLY WITH SECTION 553.7931, FLORIDA STATUTES, AND** TO MAKE ADDITIONAL CODE UPDATES (B)

Ordinance No. 150872

An ordinance of the City of Gainesville, Florida, amending Chapter 10, Article IV of the Code of Ordinances relating to false fire alarms; amending section 10-31 to update definitions; amending Sections 10-32, 10-33, 10-34 and 10-35 regarding alarm operator registration; amending Section 10-36 regarding response to fire alarm; amending Section 10-38 regarding fire alarm monitoring companies; amending Section 10-40 regarding fire alarm system contractors; amending Appendix A. Schedule of Fees, Rates and Charges related to fire alarm system contractors; providing directions to the codifier; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing clause; and providing an immediate effective date.

Explanation: The City Commission, at its meeting of July 21, 2016, directed the City Attorney to draft an amendment to the Fire Protection and Prevention Code to correspond to changes to Section 553.7931, Florida Statutes relating to false fire alarms. The Office of the City Attorney, in consultation with City staff, prepared this ordinance to include other updates and clarifications.

This ordinance requires two hearings and shall become effective

immediately upon final adoption.
