



Juvenile Auto Burglary & Auto Theft Suppression Meeting

- The Juvenile Auto Burglary & Auto Theft Suppression (JABATS), a collaborative community effort, was created during the latter months of 2018.
- The JABATS Meeting was a response to an increase of **forty-two percent for conveyance burglary offenses** and **eighteen percent for stolen vehicle offenses**.
- A statistical analysis determined that property crimes such as conveyance burglaries and stolen vehicles were attributable to juveniles in our surrounding area. In efforts to decrease our "tough on two" crimes, we focused on juvenile offenders.

 - Meetings with School Resource Officers



Juvenile Auto Burglary & Auto Theft Suppression Results

- The tracking of results and efforts are measured by crime statistical data indicating if the number of conveyance burglaries and stolen vehicles, "tough on two crimes", committed by juveniles have decreased or increased.
- During the first year of implementing JABATS there was a decrease of **sixteen percent for conveyance burglary offenses** and **fifteen percent for stolen vehicle offenses**.
- In addition to the decrease in conveyance burglaries and stolen vehicles, we decreased the number of juvenile arrests, by **sixteen percent**, an unexpected success.




Challenges Due to COVID-19

- BOLD Program
 - Limited Communication With Participants Access to Partners & Services (Evening Network & Life/Social Skills Classes Canceled)
 - Declined Access to Partners & Services (Employment, etc.)
- Florida Department of Juvenile Justice
 - DJJ Offices Are Closed to the Public, Including Youth & Their Families.
 - Alternative Methods of Contact, No Face-to-Face (Zoom, FaceTime, TEAMS, Phone Calls, "Drive Ups" -Reserved for High Risk Youth)
 - Families Have Limited Access to Services
 - Traditional Court Dates Canceled
- Gainesville Police Department
 - Increased in "Tough on Two" Crimes
 - Inadequate Juvenile Curfew Checks Due to Displacement of Youth
- Reichert House Youth Academy
 - Barrier of Communication, Attendance, & Home Visits with Youth
 - Transportation Issues With Youth, Program and Educational Institutions

Challenges Due to COVID-19 Statistical Data Analysis

- The tracking of results and efforts are measured by crime statistical data indicating if the number of conveyance burglaries and stolen vehicles, "tough on two crimes", committed by juveniles have decreased or increased.
- During the first year of COVID-19 there was an increase of **twenty-seven percent for conveyance burglary offenses** and **fifty-seven percent for stolen vehicle offenses**.
- COVID-19 restrictions maybe responsible for the decrease in juvenile arrests.
