WHAT IS THE CONSOLIDATED PLAN?

- Application for HUD funding
- Planning document required every 5 years
- Collaborative process between residents, stakeholders, and the City
- Identifies housing and community development needs and priorities
- Strategies to be followed in carrying out HUD programs
- Stipulates how HUD funding will be allocated

WHAT IS THE CONSOLIDATED PLAN?

- ➤ The City of Gainesville's plan covers the following HUD programs:
 - Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)
 - HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME)
- ➤ The City receives an annual allocation of CDBG and HOME funds from HUD to be used for housing and community development efforts.
- Funds must be used to primarily benefit low-and moderate-income persons.

WHAT IS CDBG? COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM

CDBG program is a federal program administered by HUD that provides funding for community revitalization purposes.



- Program goals include the provision of:
 - 1. Decent housing
 - 2. A suitable living environment
 - 3. Expanded economic opportunity
- Eligible CDBG activities include:
 - Housing Rehabilitation
 - Housing Counseling
 - Public Facilities/Infrastructure
 - Public Services
 - Economic Development



WHAT IS HOME? HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM

Exclusively creates or preserves affordable housing for low-income households.





- **➤** Eligible HOME activities include:
 - Homeownership Assistance
 - Housing Rehabilitation
 - Direct Rental Assistance
 - New Construction of Affordable Housing

NEEDS ASSESSMENT

- Provides a clear picture of the City's affordable housing, community development, homelessness, and nonhomeless special needs.
- > Elements of the Needs Assessment include:
 - Housing Needs Assessment
 - Public Housing
 - Homeless Needs Assessment
 - Non-Homeless Special Needs Assessment
 - Non-Housing Community Development Needs

MARKET ANALYSIS

- ➤ Provides a clear picture of the environment in which the City will administer grant programs over the course of the Consolidated Plan.
- > The Market Analysis provides information on:
 - Supply, Demand, Condition, and Cost of Housing
 - Housing Stock Available for Persons with Disabilities or Special Needs
 - Condition and Needs of Public and Assisted Housing
 - Inventory of Facilities, Housing, and Services for Homeless Persons
 - Barriers to Affordable Housing
 - Characteristics of the City's Economy



STRATEGIC PLAN

➤ Identifies the priority needs of the City and describes strategies that the City will undertake to address the priority needs.

- ➤ The Strategic Plan outlines:
 - Priority Needs
 - Geographic Priorities
 - Five-Year Expected Resources
 - Goals and Objectives
 - Measurable Outcomes


ANNUAL ACTION PLAN

Summary of the actions, activities, and programs that will take place during the program year to address the priority needs and goals identified by the Strategic Plan.


- > The Action Plan provides an outline of:
