### PROGRAM DIFFERENCES

#### **SBPP**

- No greater than 100 Employees
- Net worth < \$3 million; < \$2 million after income taxes but excluding carry-over losses
- Net worth < \$3 million for sole proprietors includes personal and business investments
- Must be located in corporate limits of the City

#### SBE

- Independently owned and operated business
- Employs no greater than 200 permanent, F/T employees
- Together with its affiliates, has a net worth of not more than \$5 million

#### **ANALYSIS OF SBPP SPENDING**

- Local business spending from FY '09 to FY '10 up over 49%
- Spending on other businesses for the same period is up over 16%
- Minority-owned spending is down over 32%
- Woman-owned spending is down over 23%



#### **ANALYSIS OF SBE SPENDING**

- FY '09 and FY '10 SBE spending increased over 24%
- Spending on other businesses during this same period increased over 36%
- Minority-owned spending was up over 2%
- Woman-owned spending was down over 37%
