Commercial Collection Timeline

Prior to 1977:

City collected and billed all solid waste services

■ 1977 to 1994:

BFI exclusively collected all city solid waste. Billed by GRU

1994 to present:

Non-exclusive franchise agreements for commercial solid waste

Commercial Contract Concerns

Length of the Contract:

Hauler A 5 years with 5 year rollover


Hauler B 3 years with 3 year rollover

Hauler C 3 years with 1 year rollover

- Automatic renewal / Limited window to cancel
- Right of first refusal / Poor service
- Rates / Automatic increases not tied to cost
- Creates perpetual contracts







2 YARD DUMPSTER - 1X WEEK SERVICE - MONTHLY CHARGE







Commercial Contract Provisions

Areas of concern:

- terms longer than one year;
- automatic renewals;
- requiring businesses to provide written notice of their intent not to renew;
- restricting businesses from buying additional services from another vendor;
- adding environmental fees, fuel surcharges or other ways increasing the quoted price for services during the term of the contract; and
- requiring a business requesting a change in their existing service level to sign a new multi-year contract.



- Low participation in multi-family settings
- Incomplete reporting of commercial recycling tonnages
- Materials not yet required to be recycled
- Expense of recycling service for all businesses, especially small generators



Options to increase participation in multi family settings

- Establish a minimum amount of recycling capacity per unit
- Require recycling containers next to each garbage dumpster
- Uniform signage & colors on garbage & recycling containers
- Require apt. mgt. to provide instructions to tenants annually
- May require split body dumpsters
- Valet service for recyclables
- Pay as you throw program for multi-family settings



Options to improve reporting of commercial recycling tonnages

- Require franchisees to keep city commercial loads separate
- All collectors of recoverable materials to report tons to city
- Require chain stores to report recyclables to city
- Or require all commercial accounts to report their numbers to the city



Options to handle materials not yet required to be recycled

- Require food scrap recycling from significant generators
- Require electronics recycling
- Require recycling of many C&D materials
- Significantly reduce the de minimus amount the ordinance exempts from recycling



Options to reduce expense of recycling service for all businesses, especially small generators

- Limit recycling charges to a specified fraction of MSW charges
- Availability of less expensive/less frequent recycling service
- Allow small businesses to be collected on residential routes
- Provide a free drop-off center for commercial recycling in city



 A further obstacle for all local governments is Florida Statute 403.7046 (3) which limits local governments' ability to regulate recycling.



Potential Options

- Maintain the status quo
- Provide some public education to businesses regarding hauler contracts
- Limit hauler contracts to one year by ordinance
- Put out an RFP for a nonexclusive franchise with set prices
- Create one or more exclusive franchises



Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Committee:
