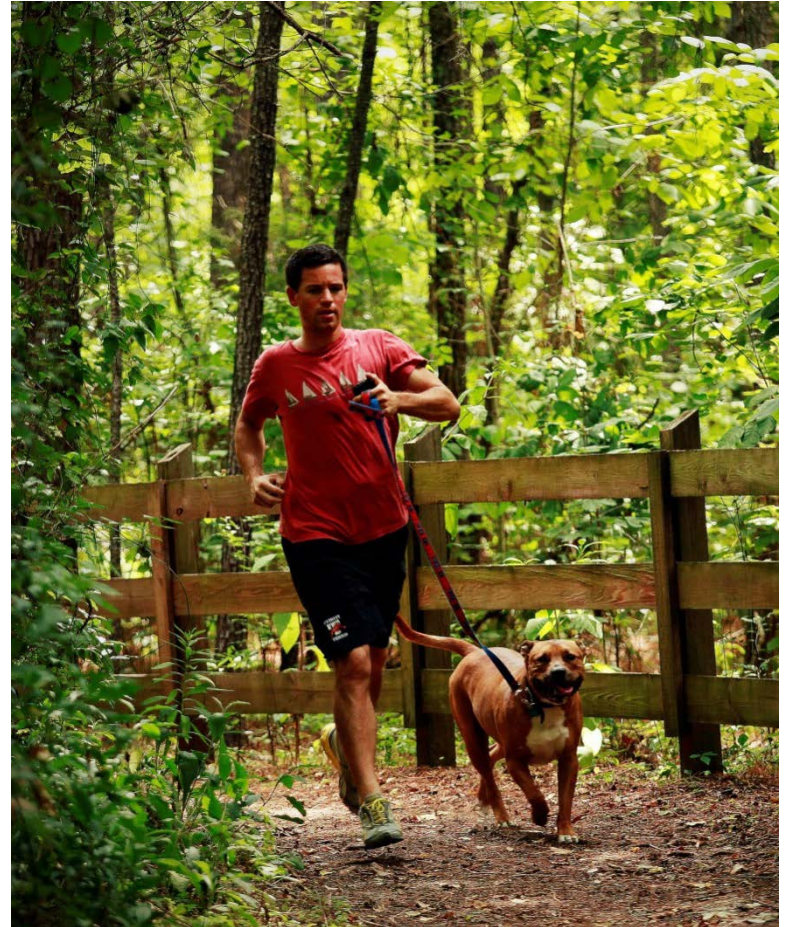

Sales Tax for Wild Spaces Public Places

- Sales tax implemented through voter referendum (Wild Spaces Public Places model ½ cent)
- Generates funds over relatively short time frame
- Eight years will generate \$46,548,352
- 67% of the county voters said they would support

Next Steps

1. Endorse and recommend the list of City projects to submit to the City Commission and then to the County for partnership consideration, and
2. Endorse and recommend the overall list of Master Plan projects to submit to the City Commission and then the County.

Proposed County Partnership Projects

- Cofrin Nature Park Nature Center - \$1,000,000
(Construct new nature center to comply with FCT grant for providing nature education programs)
- Glen Springs Acquisition and Development - \$3,000,000
(Acquire land, physical site restoration, park supporting infrastructure and water quality improvements)
- Palm Point Nature Park Expansion - \$1,000,000
(Expand parking, add boat ramp, fishing pier, small playground, pavilion, restroom)
- 352 Arts Cultural Center – \$10,000,000 (Conduct a feasibility study and business plan then develop destination Indoor/Outdoor Performing Arts Venue with amphitheater, black box theatre space, studios, etc.)

Proposed County Partnership Projects

- New Nature Center in Hoggtowne Creek Headwaters Nature Park - \$1,500,000 (Construct nature center to comply with FCT grant for providing nature education programs)
- Sweetwater Branch Recreational Trail - \$1,700,000 (Develop 12' multiuse path from Depot Park to Williston Road at SW 16th Ave then along Williston Rd south side from 16th Ave to Sweetwater Wetlands Park and Sweetwater Preserve Park)
- Citizen Field Renovations - \$5,000,000 (Redevelop the entire complex adding parking structures, exterior and interior upgrades and beautification, new entrances, renovate press box, add ADA seating on west side. 2024 the City agreement expires)

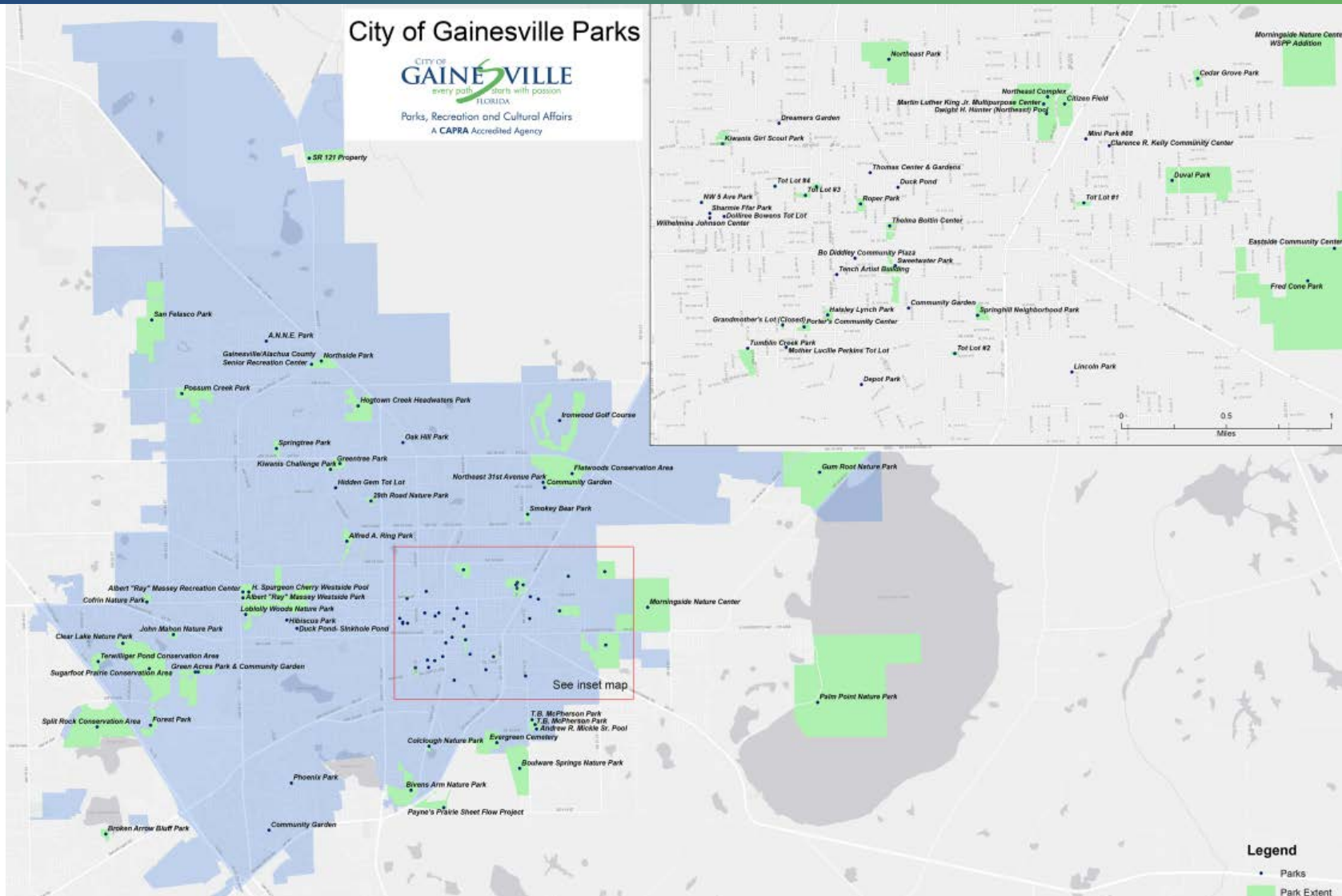
Proposed County Partnership Projects

- Implement the 352 ARTS Roadmap throughout the County - \$750,000 to expand programs for youth, create annual web-based cultural calendars, create artist directories, hold cultural conferences & workshops focusing on the arts, expand branding, implement other 352 Arts Roadmap initiatives.
- Complete Sweetwater Wetlands Park - \$2,500,000 to include a Visitor Center for educational purposes with observation towers and bat house.

City Project List

- Next for consideration is the lengthy list of projects identified in the Master Plan that needs to also be submitted to the County on February 19, 2016.

Trails and Bikeways System

- Increase connectivity throughout the city, providing safe places for bicycles, pedestrians and skaters to travel
- Improve and develop trailheads with restrooms, drinking fountains, repair stations, benches



Proposed Trail Connections

1. Complete 6th St. Trail to 39th Ave and then 53rd Ave;
2. Create NE 31st Ave Trail from NE 15th St. to Waldo Rd;
3. Create SE 8th Ave Trail from GTEC building to Lincoln Middle School;
4. Create SE 15th St Trail from Lincoln Middle School to TB McPherson Park then to Boulware Springs Park and the Gainesville/Hawthorne Trail;
5. Continue 40th Blvd Trail along SW 47th Ave from 40th to SW 27th St;
6. Finish the Norton Trail west along NW 45th Ave from 34th St to Norton Elementary School; and
7. Create the Sweetwater Recreational Corridor between Depot Park to SW 16th St and further to Williston Rd.
