Mark is currently at home for the summer with nothing to do.

There are no out summer activities for middle schoolers in his neighborhood that his mom could find out about.

The programs that exist are too far away. His mom works and the bus only comes so far. He really wants to try something new.



#### **AISHA**

Aisha gets home from school around 2:30 every day.

Her parents cannot afford the afterschool program at her school. They work until after 5pm.

Aisha chats online or hangs out in the neighborhood until dark. She needs guidance and is starting to look to her peers.



#### **DeANDRE**

DeAndre is a good student with a quick mind. However, his grades have been plunging.

He's bored. He wants to continue his passion for tennis but there are no courts in his neighborhood.

He takes the bus to a facility several miles away to practice and gets home very late.




#### CHASE


Chase is in 4<sup>th</sup> grade at a "B" school. Her parents work full time and are doing well enough for their family of four to get by. Chase works hard at school but she often needs help understanding what she reads. The words seem to get confusing on the page.

The afterschool programs in her area help keep her active but they only provide supervised "homework time". Chase usually shoves her unfinished work in her book bag to bring home. There is no one there who can help her understand and learn.


#### The Current Situation: Statistics



In 2018, 93% of Juvenile Arrests in the City of Gainesville were Black Youth.



Dept. of Juvenile Justice reports that Alachua County has the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest Disproportionate Minority Contact Rate (RRI) in the State.



Juvenile Arrests are down 73% since 2007.



Alachua County has the highest achievement gap in the State.

### Implications

- 2. Vulnerable Populations Need Additional Support.

Currently, BOOST providers in Alach—ua County offer support to a diverse youth population. Indications, however, reveal that more needs to be done to satisfy the specific developmental needs of diverse youth identities and attend to vulnerable and marginalized populations of youth in Alachua County.

- 3. All Programs Need More Awareness Surrounding Identity and Equity.
- 4. Youth Development Work is Under Resourced.

### Recommendations


- 1. Conduct a comprehensive needs assessment for youth ages 6–18 that incorporates the perspectives of youth, youth program providers, parents, community members and other stakeholders of the Alachua County community.


