## **ORDINANCE NO.** <u>110171</u>

An ordinance amending the City of Gainesville 2000-2010 2 Comprehensive Plan Solid Waste Element by updating and amending 3 4 the Objectives and Policies as more specifically set forth in this ordinance; providing directions to the city manager and the codifier; 5 6 providing a severability clause; providing a repealing clause; and 7 providing an effective date. 8 WHEREAS, publication of notice of a public hearing was given that the Solid Waste 9 10 Element of the City of Gainesville 2000-2010 Comprehensive Plan be amended, as more specifically described in this ordinance; and 11 WHEREAS, notice was given and publication made as required by law and a public 12 hearing was held by the City Plan Board on June 23, 2011; and 13 14 WHEREAS, notice was given and publication made of a public hearing which was then held by the City Commission on August 9, 2011; and 15 WHEREAS, pursuant to law, an advertisement no less than two columns wide by 10 16 inches long was placed in a newspaper of general circulation notifying the public of this 17 proposed ordinance and of the public hearing to be held in the City Commission Meeting Room, 18 First Floor, City Hall, in the City of Gainesville at least seven (7) days after the day the first 19 20 advertisement was published; and 21 WHEREAS, pursuant to law, after the public hearing at the transmittal stage, the City of Gainesville transmitted copies of this proposed change to the Reviewing Agencies and any other 22 23 local government unit or state agency that requested same; and 24 WHEREAS, a second advertisement no less than two columns wide by 10 inches long was placed in the aforesaid newspaper notifying the public of the second Public Hearing to be 25

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1	held at the adoption stage at least five (5) days after the day the second advertisement was

3	WHEREAS, public hearings were held pursuant to the published notices described				
4	above at which hearings the parties in interest and all others had an opportunity to be and were,				
5	in fact, heard; and				
6	WHEREAS, prior to adoption of this ordinance, the City Commission has considered				
7	written comments, if any were received, concerning this plan amendment.				
8	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE

10	Section	<b>1.</b> The Solid Waste Element of the City of Gainesville 2000-2010 Comprehensive			
11	Plan is amended by amending the Objectives and Policies as follows:

13 14 15	GOAL 1 PROVIDE FO	OR THE MANAGEMENT OF SOLID AND HAZARDOUS WASTES IN A			
16 17 18	MANNER WHICH ASSURES PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY, PROTECTS ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES, AND CONSERVES ENERGY.				
18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25	Objective 1.1	By 2001 2020, reduce by 50% 75% the amount of solid waste that would have been disposed of in the absence of landfill diversion practices such as recycling, reuse and composting. The City shall establish a goal of recycling recyclable solid waste at a rate of 40% by December 31, 2012; 50% by December 31, 2014; 60% by December 31, 2016; 70% by December 31, 2018; and 75% by December 31, 2020.			
26 27 28 29	Policy 1.1.1	The City shall minimize the amount of solid waste that must be disposed of in a landfill. In order of priority, minimization shall be attained by (1) source reduction of waste; (2) re-use; (3) recycling; (4) composting; and (5) landfilling.

This information is published in the State of Florida Recycling and Education Grant proposal submitted annually to the State of Florida Department of Environmental Protection by Alachua County on behalf of all local governments within the County.	
23 24 25	Policy 1.3.2	The City, in cooperation with Alachua County, shall continue to sponsor solid and hazardous waste education programs for school students and interested citizens.

This report shall be updated at least annually. This information is published in the State of Florida Recycling and Education Grant proposal submitted annually to the State of Florida Department of Environmental Protection by Alachua County on behalf of all local governments within the County.

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1 promote recycling to locate within the Gainesville area. 2 Objective 1.4 Establish a level of service (LOS) standard for the disposal of solid waste 3 generated by current and future City waste generators. 4 5 6 Policy 1.4.1 The following LOS standard for disposal and collection capacity shall be established: 0.655 tons of solid waste per capita per year disposed (3.6 pounds of 7 solid waste per capita per day disposed). The City shall continue to maintain 8 contracts with solid waste haulers and landfill operators that require replacement 9 and purchase of collection trucks necessary to collect 1.07 tons of solid waste per 10 capita per year (5.9 pounds per capita per day). 11 12 13 Policy 1.4.2 The City shall continue to ensure that waste tonnages being generated within city limits are being accurately monitored by requiring monthly reporting of solid 14 waste tonnages being delivered to disposal facilities as required by Section 15 403.706(18), F.S. Monthly tonnages shall also be reported for recyclables 16 (including yard trash). 17 18 19 Objective 1.5 The City shall coordinate with solid waste management facility providers for future increases in disposal capacity needed to maintain adequate disposal service 20 levels throughout the 10-year planning period. 21 22 In accordance with the "Interlocal Agreement for Solid Waste Management 23 Policy 1.5.1 Services Between Alachua County and The City of Gainesville, Florida", Alachua 24 County shall develop and maintain solid waste management facilities as necessary 25 for the receipt, processing and/or disposal of all acceptable waste from within city 26 limits. The City shall continue to abide by an interlocal agreement with the solid 27 28 waste management facility provider(s) (currently Alachua County), effective December 21, 1998, that ensures that disposal capacity is available for the 29 disposal of 3.6 pounds of solid waste per capita per day by City waste generators. 30 This shall include, but not be necessarily limited to, all residential, commercial, 31 industrial, governmental, and institutional waste. The agreement shall remain in 32 effect until September 30, 2007 December 31, 2018. Upon mutual agreement of 33 34 the parties, the agreement may be renewed for additional five-year periods. 35 36 Policy 1.5.2 If the solid waste management facility provider(s) is, at some future date, unable to provide disposal capacity and landfill space for city waste generators, the City 37 shall increase the rate of citywide re-use, composting and recycling, prepare a 38 report investigating the feasibility of resource recovery [waste-to-energy], and 39 prohibit all development until the City can provide landfill service consistent with 40 the LOS standard or contract with a landfill service provider to dispose of the 41 42 waste. 43

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Section 2. The City Manager is authorized and directed to make the necessary changes 1 in the text, maps and other data in the City of Gainesville 2000-2010 Comprehensive Plan, or 2 3 element, or portion thereof in order to fully implement this ordinance. Section 3. It is the intent of the City Commission that the provisions of Section 1 shall 4 become and be made a part of the City of Gainesville 2000-2010 Comprehensive Plan and that 5 the sections and paragraphs of this ordinance may be renumbered in order to accomplish such 6 intentions. 7 Section 4. Within 10 days of the transmittal (first) hearing, the City Manager is authorized 8 9 and directed to transmit a comprehensive plan amendment package, including this ordinance, to the Reviewing Agencies and to any other local government unit or state agency that has filed a written 10 request for same with the City. Within 10 days of the adoption (second) hearing, the City Manager 11 12 is authorized and directed to transmit a comprehensive plan amendment package, including this ordinance, to the State Land Planning Agency and to any other Reviewing Agency, local 13 government unit or state agency that filed written comments with the City. 14 15 Section 5. If any word, phrase, clause, paragraph, section or provision of this ordinance or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, such 16 finding shall not affect the other provisions or applications of the ordinance which can be given 17 18 effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared severable. 19 Section 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are to the extent of 20 21 such conflict hereby repealed. Section 7. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage on second 22
