An ordinance of the City of Gainesville, Florida, amending the City of Gainesville Capital Improvements Element of the City of Gainesville 2000-2010 Comprehensive Plan, adopting the annual update of the 5-Year Schedule of Capital Improvements; amending the Potable Water, Recreation and Stormwater Management Elements; providing directions to the city manager; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing

clause; and providing an effective date

Recommendation: The City Commission (1) approve Petition 18CPA-05 PB and (2) adopt the proposed ordinance at the transmittal stage

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT STAFF REPORT

This petition amends the City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan to update the Capital Improvements Element, in particular, the 5-Year Schedule of Capital Improvements. State law requires that each local government's 5-Year Schedule of Capital Improvements undergo annual update. This petition provides that annual update for Fiscal Years 2004/2005 through 2008/2009.

The Elements of the Comprehensive Plan that are discussed in this petition are Potable Water, Recreation and Stormwater Management

The City Plan Board heard this petition and recommended that it be approved by the City Commission

Public notice was published in the Gainesville Sun on February 1, 2005. The Plan Board held a public hearing February 17, 2005. Planning Division staff recommended that the Plan Board approve the petition. The Plan Board recommended that the City Commission approve Petition 18CPA-05 PB. Plan Board vote 6-0.

CITY ATTORNEY MEMORANDUM

Florida Statutes set forth the procedure for adoption of an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan. The first hearing is held at the transmittal stage and must be advertised seven days prior to the first public hearing. The second hearing will be held at the adoption stage of the ordinance and must be advertised five days before the adoption hearing.

The Plan amendment will not become effective until the State Department of Community Affairs issues a final order determining the adopted amendment to be in compliance in accordance with the Local Government Comprehensive Planning and Land Development Regulation Act, or until the Administration Commission (Governor and Cabinet) issues a final order determining the adopted amendment to be in compliance.

Recommendation

Planning Division Staff recommends approval of Petition 18CPA-05PB.

Explanation

This petition amends the City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan to update the Capital Improvements Element, in particular, the 5-Year Schedule of Capital Improvements. State law requires that each local government's 5-Year Schedule of Capital Improvements undergo annual update. This petition provides that annual update for Fiscal Years 2004/2005 through 2008/2009.

Attachment 1 contains the strike-through and underline changes to the 5-Year Schedule of Capital Improvements

Reasons for proposed changes

The 5-Year Schedule of Capital Improvements is being amended to meet the State's annual update requirement (Chapter 163). The new schedule is for Fiscal Years 04/05 - 08/09 Individual changes within the 5-Year Schedule are discussed below

Potable Water

Capital project information under Potable Water has been updated since the previous 5-Year Schedule. These projects expand plant capacity and improve pressure, which are related to adopted LOS standards. The primary changes have to do with fiscal year schedule

- changes and the costs of the projects. The projects are explained more fully in Numbers 2 and 3 below.
- 2 The Murphree Water Treatment Plant Filter System Upgrade will expand plant capacity to a total maximum day capacity of 65 mgd This project should be completed by end of FY 2008/2009, and it is to meet projected capacity needs. The 5-Year Schedule has been amended to reflect cost changes. The previous \$250,000 amount was for design and testing. The new amount reflects construction costs since testing indicated a need to begin construction of the project more rapidly than originally anticipated. The first phase of construction is set in FY 2007/2008, with completion anticipated in FY 2008/2009. This is a fully funded project.
- 3. The water main projects at locations on NW 53rd Avenue, NW 43rd Street, NW 39th Avenue, and NW 23rd Avenue are needed to ensure adequate water pressure (an adopted LOS standard). These water main additions are needed to ensure that the adopted LOS is met and accommodates increased water demands. The phasing of the individual project components has changed slightly. The NW 34th Street to NW 43rd Street project has been combined with the NW 43rd Street to NW 46th Avenue project for a single phase. This results in changes in dates and budgeted amounts for that project phase. Since some of these project phases have moved beyond the design phase, the costs have increased to reflect the construction costs.

Recreation

- Several capital projects at Cone Park have been completed and need to be removed from the list as a result. Also, some projects have been reconsidered with the concept that a gym will be added to this park. There is currently no funding source for the gym, but it will be added to the 5-Year Schedule when a funding source has been identified.
- 2. Four new park projects have been added to the Recreation section. The Skate Park at Depot Park is a new skateboard facility projected for completion in FY 2005/2006 and is being funded by 1999 Lease-In/Lease Out proceeds. It is located in the southeast quadrant of the city.
- 3 The Phoenix Playground is a proposed new facility to be located in the Phoenix subdivision (recently annexed area in 2002) for the

- residents of that neighborhood. It is located in the southwest quadrant of the city.
- 4 Cofrin Nature Park is a new park facility being added in the northwest quadrant of Gainesville Eventually this park will house an educational/interpretive center. The initial park construction plans include: nature trails, driveway, parking, fencing and signs
- Hogtown Greenway Phase Ib, Loblolly Woods, north is an extension of the existing Hogtown Greenway. This phase includes: new trail system, boardwalk, and signs. It is located in the northwest quadrant of the city.

Stormwater Management

- The Northeast Boulevard/Duck Pond Improvements are nearing completion. The changes in cost and dates reflect the final expenditures to be made with completion of the project. This will occur during FY 2004/2005 (the current budget year). This project includes plantings and rebuilding the center island wall.
- The Brownfield Project has been renamed the Depot Park Project to more correctly reflect the fact that the facility will not only provide stormwater management, but it will also be a park/recreation area. Changes in the total cost of this project reflect expenditures already made in FY 2003/2004. Completion of the stormwater ponds is anticipated in FY 2006/2007.
- Fiscal year changes in the Sweetwater Branch-Paynes Prairie Outfall Facilities project reflect that the project has been moved up in time because funding is anticipated to be available sooner than expected. Phase 1 of this project is two retention ponds and stream restoration. Phase 2 involves Paynes Prairie wetland treatment.
- The Hogtown Creek Sedimentation Project has been deleted from the 5-Year Schedule because of contraction in the funding source (Army Corp of Engineers program).
- 5 The Courthouse Connector project is a piping system to pipe stormwater from the new courthouse to the Depot Stormwater Park Project completion is expected in FY 2007/2008

- 6 In addition, the following stormwater projects have been added with completion dates as shown in the 5-Year Schedule of Improvements:
 - a. The NW 14th Avenue Stormwater facility (stormwater pond)
 - b College Park Improvements (study and construction)
 - c Duval Neighborhood Basin (stormwater park)
 - d. Lincoln Estates piping (ditch closing with pipe replacement)
 - e Tumblin' Creek (Porter's Area) (infrastructure improvements)
 - f Springhill Neighborhood (sediment trap)
 - g Tumblin' Creek restoration (wetland restoration)
 - h. Little Hatchett & Lake Forest Creeks Basin Management Action Plan (study)

Ms. Onelia Lazzari was recognized. Ms. Lazzari indicated that the petition involved an update to the 5-year Schedule of Capital Improvements. She noted that there were some changes documented in the report provided to the board in their packets. She noted, however, those listed were not all the City's capital improvements, only those related to the Comprehensive Plan and the adopted Level of Service Standards. Ms. Lazzari reviewed the changes to the plan. She offered to answer any questions from the board.

Mr. Gold referred to the improvements for Cone Park, and noted that many items on the plan had been stricken.

Ms. Lazzari explained that some of the items had been stricken because of the possibility of constructing a gym. She noted that others such as the community center and stormwater facility had been stricken because they had been constructed. She noted that others had been stricken because of a lack of funding.

Mr. Cohen discussed his work on the committee that had raised funds. He explained that many of the projects at Cone Park had been delayed because of the cost of the unanticipated need for fill in the 100-year floodplain. He noted that most of the funds were raised through private donations and grants. He indicated that further forts were needed because of the failure of the recreation tax.

Ms. Lazzari agreed that some of the improvements could have been completed had the sales tax been approved. She indicated that she wished to acknowledge the assistance of Jeff Moffitt of the Parks and Recreation Department for his assistance in preparing the report. She explained that Parks and Recreation was actively seeking funds for the gymnasium at Cone Park.

Mr. Gold asked about the location of the 14th Avenue stormwater facility.

Ms. Lazzari indicated that it was in one of the residential neighborhoods and would be a stormwater pond to help with drainage in the area.

Mr. Gold referred to the LOS Standards and noted that there were no roads funded.

Ms. Lazzari stated that there were no road improvements related to Level of Service Standards. She explained that, in the regular City capital budget there might be funds for resurfacing roads or installing curbs, however, those were maintenance type issues and LOS issues.

Mr. Reiskind asked if the Phoenix Playground was a neighborhood park.

Ms Lazzari indicated that it was.

here was discussion of levels of service in the 5-year Schedule of Capital Improvements.

Mr. Cohen noted that the preponderance of projects were in east Gainesville. He asked if this was intentional.
