Youth Entrepreneurial Farm and Food Preservation Project (FFPP)

What is FFPP?

FFPP employs and empowers young adults (14-17yrs) to learn life skills and independence through their work in growing, processing, and marketing fresh local foods. Youth learn community development, public speaking, planning; and leadership skills; service; business management; and professional ethics.



Accomplishments

- Six youth are now part of the program, which will grow to include twelve in Fall of 2002.
- 600 pound of fresh produce in first quarter of production and preserved \$1600 value added product since October 2001.
- Feeding 500 hungry and homeless people freshly cooked meal
- National Partnerships: August 16-18, 2002, the FFPP will host a national conference entitled "Rooted in Community", where 120 to 150 young rural and urban leaders will discuss the future of food, agriculture, and community.

Gardening has been found (San Antonio, TX) to be the most effective solution to youth problems. It is much more effective than sports. Records show that after students are involved in gardening that their school attendance, morale and grades improve. Gang activity decreases sharply in neighborhoods where the youth are engaged in gardening.
