15	which was then held by the City Commission on August 9, 2011; and
16	WHEREAS, pursuant to law, an advertisement no less than two columns wide by 10
17	inches long was placed in a newspaper of general circulation notifying the public of this
18	proposed ordinance and of the public hearing to be held at the transmittal stage in the City
19	Commission Meeting Room, First Floor, City Hall, in the City of Gainesville at least seven (7)
20	days after the day the first advertisement was published; and
21	WHEREAS, pursuant to law, after the public hearing at the transmittal stage, the City of
22	Gainesville transmitted copies of this proposed change to the State Land Planning Agency and any
23	other local government unit or state agency that requested same; and
24	WHEREAS, a second advertisement no less than two columns wide by 10 inches long
25	was placed in the aforesaid newspaper notifying the public of the second public hearing to be

	Section 2. The City Manager is authorized and directed to make the necessary changes
6	in the text, maps and other data in the City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan, or element, or
7	portion thereof in order to fully implement this ordinance.
8	Section 3. It is the intent of the City Commission that the provisions of Section 1 shall
9	become and be made a part of the City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan and that the sections
10	and paragraphs of this ordinance may be renumbered in order to accomplish such intentions.
11	Section 4. Within 10 days of the transmittal (first) hearing, the City Manager is authorized
12	and directed to transmit a comprehensive plan amendment package, including this ordinance, to the
13	Reviewing Agencies and to any other local government unit or state agency that has filed a written
14	request for same with the City. Within 10 days of the adoption (second) hearing, the City Manager
15	is authorized and directed to transmit a comprehensive plan amendment package, including this
16	ordinance, to the State Land Planning Agency and to any other Reviewing Agency, local
17	government unit or state agency that filed written comments with the City.
18	Section 5. If any word, phrase, clause, paragraph, section or provision of this ordinance
19	or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, such
20	finding shall not affect the other provisions or applications of the ordinance which can be given
21	effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provisions or application, and to this end the
22	provisions of this ordinance are declared severable.

Section 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are to the extent of

such conflict hereby repealed.

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1	Section 7. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage on second
2	reading; however, the effective date of this plan amendment, if the amendment is not timely
3	challenged, shall be 31 days after the State Land Planning Agency notifies the City that the plan
4	amendment package is complete in accordance with Chapter 163.3184, F.S. If timely challenged,
5	this amendment shall become effective on the date the State Land Planning Agency or the
6	Administration Commission enters a final order determining this adopted amendment to be in
7	compliance in accordance with Chapter 163.3184, F.S. No development orders, development
8	permits, or land uses dependent on this amendment may be issued or commenced before this plan
9	amendment has become effective.
