Lurrie Bell Headlines; Florida Highwaymen and International Artists Showcase at JFest 2008

Gainesville, Fla. – May 19, 2008 – The Cotton Club Museum and Cultural Center's 2nd Annual Juneteenth Festival & Juried Art Show (JFest) will celebrate African-American cultural heritage and Freedom at Lincoln Park on June 14-15, 2008 (Father's Day weekend).

The legendary Lurrie Bell, son of Chicago blues harmonica master Carey Bell, is the JFest 2008 Headliner, which is co-sponsored by the North Central Florida Blues Society. Voted Most Outstanding Guitar Player in 2007 by the Living Blues magazine critics' poll, he was nominated for a 2007 Blues Music Award for Best Guitarist by the Blues Foundation Bell's music draws upon his own history, using his personal tragedies and hardships to form the core of his music. This is a core principle in blues music, and Lurrie Bell's brand of the blues is all the richer for it Mr Bell will perform at JFest, Saturday, June 14 at 7:30 p.m.

Bill Barnard of the North Central Florida Blues Society had this to say about Lurrie Bell: "I'm really excited about it" "[It's a] chance to get one of the most authentic Chicago style blues players into town"

JFest 2008 also welcomes guest artists the Florida Highwaymen who will share their art on scenes of Florida's subtropical wilderness. Hailed as "Florida's African-American Landscape Painters," this group started during the time of segregation when they were not allowed to sell their work at sales venues leaving Florida's highways as their marketplace. The vibrant colors in these painted landscapes will be very familiar to Floridian art collectors, as their work has been widely collected in the past 30 years. To see the fearlessness in the Highwaymen's color palette and know the struggles they faced in the mid-twentieth century art market is a testament to the tenacity of the spirit of these artists. Even more remarkable is the fact that these art pioneers were self-taught. The 26-member group, which includes one woman, was inducted into the Florida Artists Hall of Fame in 2004. At least eight of them, including original Highwaymen Roy McLendon, John Daniels, and Mary Ann Carroll, will be joining us at JFest this year

Debbie Gallagher of the Alachua County Schools' Fine Arts department said the Highwaymen were used as part of a two year art class study on Florida art a few years ago. "Almost every year you will find art teachers who have their children learning about the Highwaymen," she said. "Rather than read about something in a book, or researching something on the web [...] when you get to actually put a face to human history, that's a pretty special thing."

This year's festival also draws artists from an international base. Olaniyi Idowu Alani from Sao Paulo, Brazil; Oladimeji Adisa from Liverpool, England; and Traoré Oumarou from Aulnay-sous-bois, France are just a few of the international artists that will showcase at this year's festival. Returning for his 2nd year, poster artist Kenneth Moses Ogungbemi, a Nigerian currently residing in Brazil, has exhibited internationally for many years. Through their artwork and presence, these artists will embody the diversity of the African heritage experience that JFest seeks to promote
