A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GAINESVILLE, FLORIDA, RELATING TO THE PROVISION OF FIRE SERVICES, FACILITIES AND PROGRAMS IN THE CITY OF GAINESVILLE, FLORIDA; IMPOSING FIRE SERVICES SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS AGAINST ASSESSED PROPERTIES LOCATED WITHIN THE CITY FOR THE FISCAL YEAR THAT BEGINS OCTOBER 1, 2015; PROVIDING FOR EXEMPTIONS; APPROVING THE ASSESSMENT ROLL; PROVIDING FOR THE ESTIMATED FIRE SERVICES ASSESSED COST; APPROVING THE RATE OF ASSESSMENT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of Gainesville, Florida (the "City Commission"), has enacted Ordinance No. 070623, codified in Chapter 11 of the Code of Ordinances, (the "Ordinance"), which authorizes the imposition of Fire Services Special Assessments for fire services, facilities, and programs against all Assessed Property located within the City;

WHEREAS, the imposition of a Fire Services Special Assessment for fire services, facilities, and programs each fiscal year is an equitable and efficient method of allocating and apportioning the Fire Services Assessed Cost among parcels of Assessed Property;

WHEREAS, the City Commission desires to impose a fire services special assessment in the City using the procedures provided by the Ordinance for the Fiscal Year beginning on October 1, 2015;

WHEREAS, the City Commission, on July 21, 2015, adopted Resolution No. 150069 (the "Preliminary Rate Resolution");

WHEREAS, the Preliminary Rate Resolution contains and references a brief and general description of the fire services, facilities and programs to be provided to Assessed Property; describes the method of apportioning the Fire Services Assessed

Cost to compute the Fire Services Special Assessment for fire services, facilities, and programs against Assessed Property; estimates the rate of assessment; and directs the updating and preparation of the Assessment Roll and provision of the notice required by the Ordinance;

WHEREAS, in order to impose Fire Services Special Assessments for the Fiscal Year that begins October 1, 2015, the Ordinance requires the City Commission to adopt an Annual Rate Resolution which establishes the rate of assessment and approves the Assessment Roll for the upcoming Fiscal Year, with such adjustments as the City Commission deems appropriate, after hearing comments and objections of all interested parties;

WHEREAS, the Assessment Roll has heretofore been made available for inspection by the public, as required by the Ordinance;

WHEREAS, notice of a public hearing has been published and mailed, as required by the terms of the Ordinance, which provides notice to all interested persons of an opportunity to be heard; the proof of publication being attached hereto as Appendix A; the proof of mailing being attached hereto as Appendix B; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on September 10, 2015, and comments and objections of all interested persons have been heard and considered as required by the terms of the Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF GAINESVILLE, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. AUTHORITY. This resolution is adopted pursuant to the Ordinance, the Preliminary Rate Resolution, Article VIII, Section 2, Florida Constitution, Sections 166.021 and 166.041, Florida Statutes, and other applicable provisions of Law.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS AND INTERPRETATION. This resolution constitutes the Annual Rate Resolution as defined in the Ordinance. All capitalized

terms in this resolution shall have the meanings defined in the Ordinance and the Preliminary Rate Resolution.

SECTION 3. IMPOSITION OF FIRE SERVICES SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS.

(A) The parcels of Assessed Property described in the Assessment Roll, which is hereby approved, are hereby found to be specially benefited by the provision of the fire services, facilities, and programs described or referenced in the Preliminary Rate Resolution, in the amount of the Fire Services Special Assessment set forth in the Assessment Roll, a copy of which was present or available for inspection at the above referenced public hearing and is incorporated herein by reference. It is hereby ascertained, determined and declared that each parcel of Assessed Property within the City will be specially benefited by the City's provision of fire services, facilities, and programs in an amount not less than the Fire Services Special Assessment for such parcel, computed in the manner set forth in the Preliminary Rate Resolution. Adoption of this Annual Rate Resolution constitutes a legislative determination that all parcels assessed derive a special benefit in a manner consistent with the legislative declarations, determinations and findings as set forth in the Ordinance, the Preliminary Rate Resolution, and this Annual Rate Resolution from the fire services, facilities, or programs to be provided and a legislative determination that the Fire Services Special Assessments are fairly and reasonably apportioned among the properties that receive the special benefit as set forth in the Preliminary Rate Resolution.

(B) The method for computing Fire Services Special Assessments described and referenced in the Preliminary Rate Resolution is hereby approved. The Parcel Apportionment methodology described in Section 6 of the Preliminary Rate Resolution is hereby approved.

(C) For the Fiscal Year beginning October 1, 2015, the estimated Fire Services Assessed Cost to be assessed is \$5,365,000.00. The Fire Services Assessment to be

assessed and apportioned among benefited parcels pursuant to the Cost Apportionment and Parcel Apportionment to generate the estimated Fire Services Assessed Cost for the Fiscal Year that begins October 1, 2015, is hereby established as follows:

\$78.00 per Net Factored Fire Protection Unit

(D) The above rate of assessment is hereby approved. Fire Services Assessments for fire services, facilities, and programs in the amounts set forth in the Assessment Roll, as herein approved, are hereby levied and imposed on all parcels of Assessed Property described in such Assessment Roll for the Fiscal Year that begins on October 1, 2015.

(E) No Fire Services Assessment shall be imposed on a parcel of government property whose building use is wholly exempt from ad valorem taxation as provided by Florida law.

(F) Any shortfall in the estimated Fire Services Assessed Cost caused by or attributed to any reduction or exemption from payment of the Fire Services Assessments required by law and this Resolution shall be made whole from any legally available funds, and shall not be paid for by proceeds or funds derived from the Fire Services Assessments. To this extent, the City Commission expects to budget and appropriate during the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2015, from any legally available revenues an amount sufficient to cover the anticipated cost of providing fire services, facilities, and programs to any lawfully exempted properties, and any reduction in the Fire Services Assessed Cost.

(G) As authorized in Section 11-43 of the Ordinance, interim Fire Services Assessments are also levied and imposed against all property for which a Certificate of

Occupancy is issued after adoption of this Annual Rate Resolution based upon the rates of assessment approved herein.

(H) Fire Services Assessments shall constitute a lien upon the Assessed Property so assessed equal in rank and dignity with the liens of all state, county, district or municipal taxes and other non-ad valorem assessments. Except as otherwise provided by law, such lien shall be superior in dignity to all other liens, titles and claims, until paid.

(I) On or before September 15 of each fiscal year the Fire Services Special Assessment is imposed, the Mayor or Mayor Pro Tem is authorized to certify the non-ad valorem assessment roll on compatible electronic medium to the tax collector.

(J) The Assessment Roll, as herein approved, together with the correction of any errors or omissions as provided for in the Ordinance, shall be billed, collected and enforced pursuant to the method of collection described in Section 11-61 of the Ordinance and Section 10 of the Preliminary Rate Resolution. The Assessment Roll, as delivered to the Tax Collector, shall be accompanied by a Certificate to Non-Ad Valorem Assessment Roll in substantively the form attached hereto as Appendix C.

SECTION 4. CONFIRMATION OF PRELIMINARY RATE RESOLUTION. The Preliminary Rate Resolution, as amended and supplemented herein, is hereby confirmed.

SECTION 5. EFFECT OF ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION. The adoption of this Annual Rate Resolution shall be the final adjudication of the issues presented (including, but not limited to, the determination of special benefit and fair apportionment to the Assessed Property, the method of apportionment and assessment, the rate of assessment, the Assessment Roll and the levy and lien of the Fire Services

Assessments), unless proper steps shall be initiated in a court of competent jurisdiction to secure relief within 20 days from the date of this Annual Rate Resolution.

SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY. If any word, phrase, clause, paragraph, section or provision of this resolution or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, such finding shall not affect the other provisions or applications of the resolution which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this resolution are declared severable.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Annual Rate Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage and adoption.

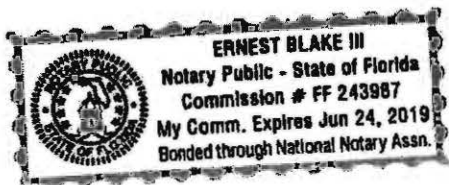

STETSON UNIVERSITY Students to share space with senior adults

Arrangement may be first of its kind

DELAND — When senior adults settle into a newly renovated assisted living facility later this year, there will already be some much younger neighbors living upstairs.

This living arrangement for Stetson University students may be the first of its kind in the U.S., experts say, but the experts and everyone involved see it as an opportunity for both demographics.

"We are not worried about it working at all," said Lisa Hancock, vice provost campus life and student success at Stetson, adding that first-year and upper-class students moving in this weekend will have separate floors and separate entrances from the older residents.

"We have been in early conversation with the owners about working together in the future on opportunities such as an internship and volunteer hours for our students."

"The feedback has been very positive," said Catherine Guay, the sales and leasing manager of the Grand Villa of DeLand.

When the building was a Clarion Hotel, Stetson leased space in 2013 for 140 beds to meet the need of a growing student body. The West International Speedway Boulevard property was renamed the DeLand Inn before being sold to Vantage Partners of Birmingham, Michigan, with plans to convert the six-story building into an assisted living facility with a memory care component.

Stetson's lease runs until 2016 and the first wave of senior adult residents are expected to move in by November, living beneath students young enough to be grandchildren.

"This is a new concept I haven't heard of," said Kristen Kinney, director of community health with the Florida Health Care Association. "We have seen inter-generational programs where a preschool is on the same campus, but nothing like this. And those have been successful, so having youth engaged with the seniors is a great way to enhance their quality of life."

Rachel Reeves, director of communications with the National Center for Assisted Living, which oversees 3,500 centers across the country, said she, too, has never heard of this dynamic anywhere else in the U.S.

But that doesn't mean it's totally unheard of.

Big support for ballot initiatives

With backing from four major electric utilities, a newly formed group known as "Consumers for Smart Solar" raised \$467,000 in July for a solar-energy ballot initiative, according to a finance report filed this week.

The group last month announced it would seek to put a solar-energy initiative on the November 2016 ballot. The proposal is competing with a rival solar-energy initiative sponsored by Florida's "Solar Choice."

The finance report indicates Consumers for Smart Solar collected \$467,000 and spent \$104,177 between July 27 and July 31. While it received large checks from several other groups, its contributions included \$30,000 from Florida Power & Light, \$30,000 from Duke Energy, \$70,000 from Gulf Power and \$25,000 from Tampa Electric Co.

Its expenditure included \$102,000 to

Nevada-based National Voter Outreach for petition gathering, according to the report. Meanwhile, Florida's Solar Choice reported that it raised \$81,758 in July, bringing its overall total to \$436,741. Also, it had received \$314,234 in in-kind contributions as of July 31.

During July, the committee received 550,000 from a political committee linked to the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy and \$25,000 from a Georgia-based group known as Conservatives for Energy Freedom, the filing said. Floridians for Solar Choice also spent \$15,021 in July, bringing its overall expenditure total to \$153,726.

Floridians for Solar Choice is further along than its rival in the process of getting on the ballot. The Florida Supreme Court has scheduled a Sept. 1 hearing to review Floridians for Solar Choice's proposed ballot language. If the Supreme Court signs off, Floridians for

Solar Choice would need to collect 685,149 valid signatures to reach the ballot. As of Monday afternoon, it had submitted 105,167 signatures.

Consumers for Smart Solar had not submitted any signatures to the state as of Monday. Meanwhile, a group seeking to ask voters in 2016 to legalize medical marijuana raised more than \$770,000 in July, buoyed by contributions from its leader, Orlando attorney John Morgan, according to a newly filed finance report.

"People United for Medical Marijuana" raised \$770,534 during the month and spent \$756,416, as it tried to collect enough petition signatures to get on the November 2016 ballot. The Morgan Firm PA contributed about \$704,000 of the July total, with Coral Gables retiree Barbara Stiefel chipping in another \$40,000, the report shows.

Notice is hereby given that the City Commission of the City of Gainesville, Florida, will conduct a public hearing to consider the imposition of annual fire special assessments for the provision of fire services within the municipal boundaries of the City of Gainesville and collection of these assessments pursuant to the tax bill collection method.

The hearing will be held at 6:00 PM, or as soon thereafter as may be heard on September 10, 2015, in the Commission Chambers of City Hall, 200 E. University Avenue, Gainesville, Florida, for the purpose of receiving public comment on the proposed assessments. All affected property owners have a right to appear at the hearing and to file written objections with the City Commission within 20 days of this notice. If a person decides to appeal any decision made by the City Commission with respect to any matter considered at the hearing, such person will need a record of the proceedings and may need to ensure that a verbatim record is made, including the testimony and evidence upon which the appeal is to be made. The assessment for each parcel of property will be based upon each parcel's classification and the total number of fire protection units attributed to that parcel.

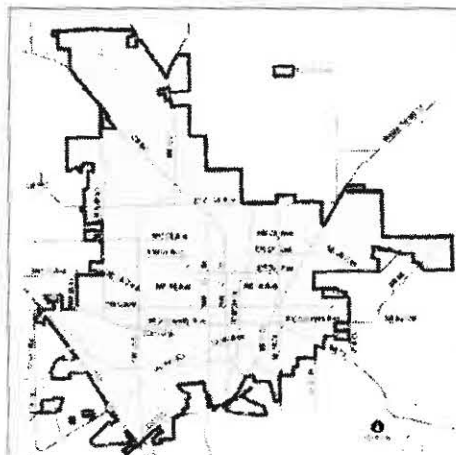

\$78.00 Per Net Factored Fire Protection Unit

Copies of the Fire Services Assessment Ordinance, the Preliminary Assessment Resolution and the Preliminary Assessment Roll are available for inspection at the City Manager's Office, City Hall, located at 200 E. University Avenue, Gainesville, Florida.

The fire services non-ad valorem assessment will be collected by the tax collector and placed on the ad valorem tax bill to be mailed in November 2015 and each year that the assessment is imposed. Failure to pay the assessments will cause a tax certificate to be issued against the property which may result in a loss of title.


