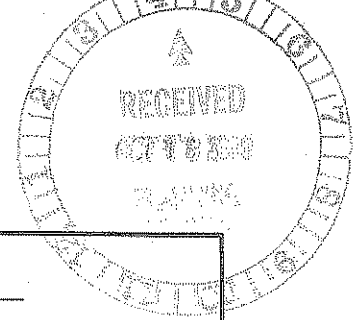

No. The use of this site is for a museum that involves the rehabilitation and reuse of this exact residence. The specific residence has historical significance as the previous residence of A. Quinn Jones, for whom the museum is being named after and identified with. Therefore, another property, with similar land use and zoning, would not be suitable for this use.

C. If the request involves nonresidential development adjacent to existing or future residential, what are the impacts of the proposed use of the property on the following:

Residential streets: *There may be a slight increase in daily trips due to the museum use compared to single-family residential use. However, the increase will be minimal, and will have little or no impact during the AM or PM peak hours. The site location is in a gridded street network that can easily accommodate additional trips, and the neighborhood is used to the trips being generated by the A. Quinn Jones school and driveway connection directly across the street. As a result, the impact to the neighborhood is expected to be minimal.*

Noise and lighting: *There will be minimal impact since the museum activity is intended to be primarily indoors. The parking lot will be small in size and landscaped to provide appropriate buffering to the residential adjacent uses. Parking lot lighting will comply with City criteria for no offsite light trespass.*

Explanation of how the proposed development will contribute to the community.

The Land Use change and Rezoning will enable the A. Quinn Jones house to be transformed into a museum, complete with exhibits and cultural displays inside the building. The exterior of the building recently underwent a historic restoration and is not intended to significantly change to accommodate the museum. The redevelopment and adaptive reuse of the residence into a museum and cultural center will provide useful educational opportunities for the community public. Citizens will be able to learn about the importance of civic leaders such as A. Quinn Jones and can understand their contributions to Gainesville's history and culture.

- G. What are the potential long-term economic benefits (wages, jobs & tax base)?

The proposed museum and cultural center will provide jobs and opportunities during the development phase, to design, permit and construct the improvements. Additional employment opportunities will be available during the operational phase, when staff members are employed to manage and operate the facility. An economic benefit may be created due to the restoration of a formerly vacant structure, which will contribute a positive benefit to the neighborhood, and could positively impact property values. Additionally, by the nature of the proposed use, the museum and cultural center should attract visitors and tourists that will utilize local goods and services nearby the facility.

- H. What impact will the proposed change have on level of service standards?

Roadways: *Minimal Impact is expected.*

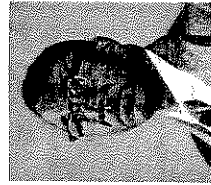
Before: A. Quinn Jones House

- We are seeking land use change to Public Facilities and zoning change to Public Services in order to allow a museum and cultural resource at the property

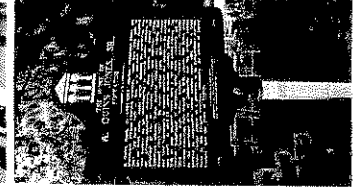

Report: Florida GOP charged lavishly on staffer's card

ST. PETERSBURG — She was a 29-year-old junior staffer when the Florida Republican Party gave her an American Express card.

Over the next 2½ years, nearly \$1.3 million in charges wound up on Melanie Platter's AmEx — \$40,000 at a London hotel, and nearly \$20,000 in plane tickets for inflated former House Speaker Ray Santorum and his wife and kids, for starters. Statements show thousands spent on jewelry, sporting goods and in one case \$15,000 for what's listed as a monthlong stay at a posh Miami Beach hotel, but which the party says was a furnished deposit.

The credit card records, obtained by the St. Petersburg Times and Miami Herald, offer the latest behind-the-scenes look at extravagance and free-wheeling spending by the party's top financial manager. Not only did certain elite legislative leaders have their own party credit cards to spend donors' money with little oversight, but Platter's records show these leaders also liberally used an underlying's card — without her knowledge, she says.

"I did not have the sole discretion to initiate credit card spending," Platter said in an e-mail statement. "Over that period of time, there were multiple instances when the

card was used to make purchases that I had no knowledge of, and I did not regularly review the monthly credit card statements which I understood were sent directly to the party's accounting office."

Even after a series of embarrassing revelations over profligate credit card spending by the likes of Republican U.S. Senate front-runner Marco Rubio, Santorum and incoming House Speaker Dean Cain — and pending state and federal investigations of party finances — revelations of the huge charges on Platter's card had veteran GOP fundraisers appalled.

"Oh my God, I can't believe it," said Al Hoffman, a top fundraiser from Fort Myers, when told of the \$1.28 million on Platter's card. "See, that's it. They have an underlying do it all. There's no reason a young assistant should be managing up charges like that."

Platter served as finance director for state House campaigns for 2½ years starting in mid 2006.

She was a Republican Party employee who mainly answered to Santorum, R-Denton, speaker-designate at the time and overseeing House campaign operations.

The job involved planning fundraising events and often accompanying Santorum and other legislative leaders on

fundraising and other political trips.

Santorum was indicted by a grand jury last year for inserting \$6 million into the state budget for an airport building that a friend and GOP contributor, Jay Odum, wanted to use as an airplane hangar. That criminal investigation revealed that Santorum charged more than \$170,000 on his party-issued credit card — everything from plane tickets for his family to chelator to electrocution.

Turns out Santorum spent heavily on Platter's card as well. Her credit card statements indicate at least four sets of plane tickets for Santorum, his wife and four kids. He also ordered Platter to accompany him on a trade trip to London in the summer of 2008. Platter brought her mother along at Santorum's encouragement, and Platter's GOP AmEx saw plenty of action: nearly \$40,000 at a London hotel, and more than \$3,600 in nightseeing expenses.

"I can't believe it. Someone should be laughed for that," Mark Goulette, a Boca Raton developer who has raised millions of dollars for Republicans, said of the party allowing as much spending on a low-level staffer's card.

Republican legislative leaders during that period were raising many millions of dollars, and they note that it costs money to

raise money. So much Platter spent on \$1,200 for Broadway tickets in New York, or \$19,000 at the Water Club restaurant during a different New York City trip may have been for evenings that raised many times that much.

Neither Platter nor the party would discuss the credit card statements in detail, citing pending state and criminal federal investigations into its financial activities as well as an exhaustive "forensic audit" of party spending about to get underway.

"The Republican Party of Florida has hired the firm Altman & Bird LLP to conduct an independent forensic investigation of the party's finances. Members of the firm's Special Matters and Investigations staff will review questionable credit card expenses to determine whether or not the party may have been the victim of inappropriate financial design," said Florida Republican Party spokeswoman Katie Betts.

"If the audit reveals any inappropriate expenses that have not been reimbursed to the party, we will seek to collect compensation from the individual who incurred the expense."

Judging what is appropriate expense may be subjective. For instance, Platter's AmEx shows \$10,000 to a watch company in California in

August 2008. Republican donors paid for Santorum to present every legislative, Democratic and Republican alike, with a memento watch.

Platter's card paid for nearly \$850,000 in lodging, \$80,000 in airfare — mostly commercial airlines — and \$66,000 for charter planes. The statements show Republican donors also paid for plane tickets to Germany for Platter and her mother.

Platter declined to discuss those tickets, though the party said the trip was part of the expense of accompanying Santorum to Europe. Now 28, Platter parlayed her insider access to become a well-funded public employee, now earning about \$70,000 yearly working for the Florida House of Representatives as a scheduler for special projects.

The Florida Democratic Party requires staffers and leaders to use their own credit cards and seek reimbursement for appropriate expenses. That's now the practice at the Florida Republican Party, and fundraiser Hoffman suggested it's about time.

"My company, with 4,000 employees, nobody had credit cards," said Hoffman, a developer. "If you want to expense, you had to submit a form with receipts... It wasn't one employee taking another out to eat and charging it all off."
