One example is a Medieval Faire with a budget of \$308,775, plus \$50,000 annually from VisitGainesville, and a School Board that further subsidizes the program by having every 6th grader attend on opening day. What might private and nonprofit partners do with what is likely \$400,000+ in total funding?

Q: What is your biggest idea for how the city might better impact your life?

- Investing in the people, especially the younger generation is important in making sure the community thrives both now and in the future. If the city can make sure that the people of the community not only have access to resources, but are also aware of resources available, that could potentially better impact the lives of many here in Gainesville.
- Targeting school systems to provide more tutoring and resources for students. Provide programs that support younger children by providing them resources to complete projects if they cannot afford the materials needed to complete them.
- I think the opening of more small businesses opens up more job opportunities, especially to students.
- As a student at the University of Florida but also a worker in the Alachua county public schools. The biggest idea for how the city might not only impact my life but minority families in the county is by creating more programs and services. With the great number of students in the county, it would only be beneficial for the community. More city programs would mean there will be a stronger community image and culture unity.
- Parents will also have a stronger sense of security for their kids. Students being involved in the community will then lead to them doing physical activities and avoid poor eating habits and then diminish the obesity statistics. There will only be positive benefits in the long run with more programs and services.
- Collaborating with UF students through campus organizations and service learning projects give students the opportunity to learn more about the surrounding Gainesville area and also partner organizations in the community with the student body. My vision would be providing local non profits access to the Gator Connect Web page where they can find student organizations who have a community based focus and work together completing service learning projects. For example the humane society working with the I love dogs student org.
- Together they can create service events to get other students actively involved in the shelter and also serve assist the shelter in reaching their goals. This consistent partnership creates a permanent liaison between the university and community. We are assisting each other one project at a time also expanding our Gainesville network.
- I think it would be great for the university to promote all types of businesses or events in the Gainesville community. It would be great for the economy but also help students connect more with Gainesville as a whole.
- The university could have food stand days for local restaurants and information fairs for different services or events that take place in Gainesville. This way students could maybe receive coupons or discounts and just learn about what is out there as a whole. Students have the ability to have a big

impact on the community and it's important for everyone to get to know the city they live in. There are so many restaurants and events that I haven't been to yet either because I'm not aware of everything out there or it isn't necessarily a place students go to.

- Have students engage more with the local community and create opportunities for students to be mentored and/or to become mentors for others.
- My big idea for how the city can impact my life is to continue to value the natural environment in such ways as green spaces like the provision that was on the ballot. This will allow for more ecological tourism thus strengthening the local economy and is good for all parties involved.
- As a student, it is very important to me for the city of Gainesville to involve the University. It would be very nice for the city to have ways for the University to be more involved in community service or clean up of community parks. I think a lot of students would enjoy this type of involvement.
- I believe that we can bring unity and acceptance to our community. We need to find a way for youth, seniors, and families to interact with one another. Whether that be with service work or by time spent with one another. The service work could range from handing out meals to the homeless, child care classes, or support group classes. Seniors in our community can offer input to both families and youth about their own personal experiences. Youth can be motivated by volunteer hours gained. Families can become involved by both learning and being teachers.
- The city needs more access to mental health help. Specifically for those in communities of low SES.
- Decreasing the achievement gap and increasing equal opportunity.
- This goes hand in hand with a strong economy. I would ultimately love to see Gainesville, as deeply embedded in the medical world as it is, to actively seek and fully display the smaller businesses and organizations that want to work with the families in the communities. If there is a family looking for someone to do one-on-one therapy with their child, this should be something that is supported within the community. There should be ways that this is reinforced to ensure that the well-being of both parent and child have been taken care of. Additionally, if the support of the community is there for these small, lesser-known workers, then they will want to stay in Gainesville and continue on with their passion to assist the families and children that are already right here.
- Have greater access to community resources for every member
- By facilitating access to diversity and knowledge to its citizens. There is many programs and opportunities for diversity of ideas, and culture, but the majority of the Gainesville residents, other than students and University related personal, do not take advantage of them. Most of the time because they do not know that the opportunity exist, or because they think the programs are only available for certain people, an example is the fact that the Museum of Natural History, provides access to all the pay exhibitions to everyone who has a food stamp card, for free. This is done in order to include everyone, and provide access to knowledge to everyone, regardless of social economic status. Another aspect that I have observe is that there is programs made to address certain problems or needs, but the citizens are not taking advantage of them. In other words providing information and including everyone will encourage more people to take advantage of the opportunities available.
- Something has to be done about GRU. Lower the rate in which we buy electricity...lower our bills and we'll have more money to put back into the community!

- I think it would be impactful if the city would encourage more community between the University of Florida and the city of Gainesville.
- Continue investments in East Gainesville; continue to build partnership between city and university; double down on developing existing urban footprint rather than expanding outward to the east or west.
- The city needs to work with the county and community on a 25 year plan for business growth. Alternative energy use and clean industry practices should be a priority with appeal to businesses through consultation and incentives. Historically we have made almost anything related to businesses a significant hurdle or burden. This plan needs to include technical training for high school students to have a well rounded set of skills and programs for kids that may not necessarily be college bound. The elementary and middle schools should have well funded support for any STEM programs. These programs need to be made known to future potential businesses so that they know that they have the communities support. It should be a priority to plan for the needed infrastructure to support the future growth. This should include an evaluation of existing zoning and roadway planning. While the bus system is good, it causes delays in much of the town and primarily runs on diesel. The buses should be hybrid or PHEV and we should have better solutions to solving the transportation problems we have created by limiting upward growth in concentrated areas and allowing wide spread residential development. I feel that strategic planning for diverse businesses focusing on selling our goods and services to the outside world, will enable us to improve areas such as the east side of the county and preserve the great communities we have.
- I believe that it is important for all Gainesville residents to have equal access to city programs and other services. It could be said that some of those who may be homeless or in low SES communities don't know of the availability of resources out there for them which is what needs to be addressed. I suggest having a community bulletin board located in multiple spots around the city that lists all of the programs and services available. Along with this, I think the city should recruit volunteers to hand out pamphlets while having one-on-one conversations with Gainesville residents to ensure any questions they may have are addressed to what they can engage in with this city
- I believe we should use the Kopper Superfund site as a solar farm. The use of this land to produce clean energy would bring healing to a gaping wound. The land is toxic and unusable for most in its current condition. If you look at this land with google maps you see an unused track.(I believe 140 acres) Imagine row upon row of solar panels shining back and giving back. This could be the beginning of Gainesville becoming an energy diverse city. We could explore, question, and put into practice the switch from non renewable energy. This site could not only be an energy producing site but also an in progress, hands-on, community education/action research site. We could use the land to learn from it. We could put into practice various types of bioremediation to detoxify the land. (Using plants and microbes to pull the toxins from the land) This scar of polluted land has given us the opportunity to grow and heal our community. It also would allow us to put into place best practices for our future. We can't take back what has happened to that land, but through this tragedy we have the opportunity and platform to be an innovative flagship city in our state and country.

- We can get this city OFF the top 10 most segregated cities in the country IF there is enough political courage to rebuff the NIMBY's and the developers and CHANGE OUR ECONOMICALLY SEGREGATED housing pattern using zoning and development standards. It will NEVER get done if the public sector will not use its prerogatives to impel the participation of the entire private sector.

ADDITIONAL COMMISSION & STAFF IDEAS

- Launch a Department of Doing to create breakthrough change around the city's business development processes
 - Deploy an online portal for greater accessibility to the process of opening a business in the city, including identifying an allowed location and permits required
 - Implement new technology to electronically process permits and to review and edit plan documents in the field
- Be a connector of local entrepreneurs to local resources
 - GatorNest (UF Entrepreneurship Consulting Project – teams of graduate students providing consulting services for local start-ups, professors with inventions, student businesses, worldwide companies employing UF alumni)
 - GAIN Investor Pitch ShootOut (Annual contest for best business idea, in October which is Gainesville Entrepreneur Month)
 - Support UF in providing seed funding to local start-ups
 - Request UF to focus on business opportunities which are solving local issues or to prioritize funding to start-ups that support the city's strategic priorities
 - Request UF to provide funding to businesses that mirror the demographics of the city – socio-economic, race, ethnicity, gender, age, etc.
- Provide city facilities as a resource for stakeholders to host training, education, and certification programs for entry-level jobs
 - Enhance transportation accessibility by improving trail access between the rail-trail system and neighboring business and residential areas
- Partner with the Chamber and UF to grow or attract international economic prospects who will provide diversity of job opportunities, from entry level to executive level, and who has a shared purpose of improving the community
- Work with UF to remove the fence and gate surrounding east campus
- Facilitate vitality assessments in CRA districts, aiming to identify the unique characteristics of neighborhoods and what they want to preserve and enhance, and develop model for expanding this evaluation and prioritization process to neighborhoods throughout the city
- Develop an application to promote learning about neighborhoods' unique history
- Support the county-wide disparity study and utilize results to make accessibility improvements
- Implement assorted transportation modes to further enhance connectivity, utilizing partnerships with services like Uber, Lyft, BikeShare, Van Pool to bring greater connectivity to the first and last miles of travel for all citizens
- Partner with GRU, PW, and private entities to provide low and no-cost internet access to Gainesville households

- Support the CRA Heartwood project and market it as a model to local developers for providing a greater supply of affordable housing
- Request UF to promote Heartwood as a graduate or professional housing resource
 - Take a similar approach to Power District and Seminary Lane?
- Assess next steps for Dignity Village and the implementation of a community-wide rapid rehousing model
- Evaluate regulatory reform to be more inclusive of tiny houses and retirement living
- Formalize an affordable housing task force to evaluate alternative models to bring to Gainesville
- Utilize city facilities and centers as a resource for UF and other stakeholders to bring visual and performing arts programming into neighborhoods
 - Example – Dance classes in ballet room at Eastside Community Center
 - Communicate this as opportunities for student volunteers and/or applications of faculty research projects
- Host UF art exhibits and performances at the Hippodrome, Downtown Plaza, Thomas Center Galleries
 - UF to have bigger presence in Downtown Arts Festival
 - Include promotion of 352Arts Initiative
- Seek state funding to bring the Safe Routes to School program to Gainesville, which will directly support increased safety and convenience for students in grades K-high school to walk and/or bicycle to/from school
- Partner with UF to provide more permanent (Mobile Outreach Unit) urgent/emergent care medical resources to the east side of Gainesville
- Implement the Vision 2020 Master Plan
- Partner with UF to achieve greater waste diversion
- Expand bike share locations available to public and market it as an amenity to visitors
- Develop additional stormwater management credit basins with incorporation of park facilities surrounding areas with redevelopment opportunities
- Apply for federal funding to support transitioning fleet assets to alternative fuel sources
- Support the revitalization and restoration of stream corridors
- Implement strategies to attract and retain talent in order to create a citizen-centered approach to the operations of local government
- Request UF and SFC to highly encourage and promote project-based learning and application in the community
 - All 16 UF schools to have a fellowship program with the city to address local challenges
 - Project Examples
 - College of Design, Construction & Planning partner with GFR & GPD to overlap GFR hot spots with GPD crime responses for predictive polices, emergency responses [National Institute of Justice real-time crime data challenge in Spring 2017 (predictive analytics)]
