Personal Statement: What is Historic Preservation?

To understand my perspectives on Historic Preservation, I begin by sharing my prior educational experiences. Last December, I had the privilege to graduate from the University of Florida with two undergraduate majors - Political Science and Geography. These two degrees in combination with an extensive study of Geospatial Information Analysis has allowed me to bring a distinctive outlook to the preservation field. The challenges facing the future of preservation with the advent of climate change and the quest for social justice offer unique opportunities to change the status quo. Through this lens, the necessity of reconciliation in preservation has become especially apparent.

Fundamentally, the background of the Historic Preservation in the United States is dominated by patriotic motivations to respect our nation's founders. The scope of the preservation movement has increased vastly since the passage of the National Historic Preservation Act in 1966. The 1966 federal initiative continues to be the guiding force behind our local, state, and federal preservation programs.

The process behind preservation has sequential steps, that have remained relatively unchanged from a procedural standpoint. First, it is necessary to set standards or criteria that define what is worth preserving; second, undertaking a survey to locate and describe resources potentially to be saved; third, evaluating the resources discovered in the survey against the standards established in step one; fourth, giving those that qualify "official status" in some way; and fifth, following up with protective measures (Stripe, p. 29).

The third procedural step in preservation examines the surveyed property to determine whether it passes the test established by the criteria adopted in step one. Unfortunately, this

aspect of the decision-making process is an imperfect approach. The arbitrary nature of these criteria can allow for political, monetary, and bias to infiltrate the process.

As mentioned in *Some Preservation Fundamentals*, "one must also recognize that preservation always has been, presently is, and always will be primarily a matter of market economies" (Stripe, p. 32). It is a reality in our capitalist and market economy, that those who possess more resources obtain significantly more influence in our collective destiny. I believe that all preservation professionals must attempt to correct these injustices.

Historic Preservation has become especially important as the United States grapples with the legacy of our past. History is not a series of facts, but it relies on individual perceptions to shape reality. It is important to note that the field of preservation has a variety of stakeholders, allowing for changes to the preservation landscape. As a result, it is necessary to see the built environment through the lens of all the community members. The shaping of our reality depends significantly on our sense of place and the built environment has a profound effect. Without preserving and remembering the past of all, repeating history becomes ever more likely. As a country, we are beginning to see these effects firsthand.

Modernization and new development have caused the twentieth century to be known as the century of destruction. "It was a century of dramatic urban expansion, improvement, and redefinition, but it was also a century when urban architectural cultural was destroyed at a rate unmatched in human history" (Tung, 2001, p. 15). The consequence of this destruction is putting a strain on our planet and people.

While working as a Graduate Researcher for the University of Florida, I have learned that preservation can be a force of righteousness. I believe that our preservation of the past should attempt to correct the injustices that have been systemically created. Focusing on the underserved

and underprivileged provides newfound hope in these communities, by offering a voice to those who have been commonly disregarded by our institutions. The in-depth research of tangible and intangible heritage of all communities and citizens is not only necessary but also vital in the quest for justice. Historic Preservation should focus not only on the act of preserving history - but also needs to focus on the community that has persevered in its fundamental quest to survive.

Refining my communication and writing skills has been influential in securing funding for new preservation projects around the Gainesville community. I have worked closely with our vulnerable African American cemeteries; many have fallen victim to a lack of support. These historic cemeteries have been commonly disregarded by our local governments, as neighboring white cemeteries receive significantly more funding and resources. To combat these injustices, the nonprofit sector and the University of Florida have come together to assist in the revitalization of a particular cemetery recognized as one of the most significant cultural resources in the state. I have personally written multiple successful grants securing the much-needed funding for this amazing and humbling project. Involving innovative initiatives that challenge an antiquated mindset displays a strong resiliency in the preservation field.

I have also been leading the charge to incorporate geospatial analysis into a variety of projects in our program. Having a multidisciplinary analysis allows for the examination of challenges facing not only a specific community but widespread geographic regions. It is especially paramount to understand how hazards and climate change affect our built environment. The incorporation of climate studies into preservation allows for comprehensive plans to be formulated around the unique needs of the community. The emergence of a strong multidisciplinary approach shows how preservation is continuing to reinvent itself by focusing

on a multitude of factors affecting our daily lives. There should be no standard definition for a preservationist, rather, it is an ideology that binds all of us.



City of Gainesville Plan Board Statement of Intent

Kim Tanzer FAIA September 30, 2021

I submitted this statement when I applied, unsuccessfully, to serve on the City of Gainesville Plan Board in 2019. I hope, with this second application, to be appointed. I have attached my brief cv, but include this extended statement of intent, which more fully reflects my decades of local service to the Gainesville community:

"Service is the rent we pay for living on the planet."

When I arrived in Gainesville as an architect and visiting assistant professor years ago, I quickly sought opportunities to provide community service. I volunteered for and was appointed to the City of Gainesville's inaugural Development Review Board. I volunteered to write guest editorials on urbanism for the *Gainesville Sun*, a practice I recently started again.

As my career unfolded, when possible, I focused my required teaching in the Department of Architecture on community-based work. I believed it was important that students learn about real people in real communities as part of their education, and that they experience the act of contributing to the community in which they live.

Together, and with the wisdom and guidance of community leaders, we worked with the Fifth Avenue/Pleasant Street neighborhood, neighborhoods surrounding the Depot area, and on the redevelopment of the SW 2nd Avenue corridor, known today as Innovation Square. I was commissioned by the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) to provide the first master plan for the Fifth Avenue/Pleasant Street CRA District, and served as one of the faculty leads for the c. 2000 EPA-funded, City-endorsed Depot Area Master Plan. I twice received Florida Humanities Council grants for project in the Fifth Avenue/Pleasant Street neighborhood. In addition, at the request of various University of Florida administrators, my students and I worked on master plans for the Performing Arts Center Area, and on the sequence of courtyards within the National Historic District leading to the Women's Gym at UF. A UF-wide charrette launched this project, which led to the refurbishment of several residential courtyards and more recently, the Plaza of the Americas.

From 1999-2009 I was among a group of UF and community leaders that launched and supported, through combined volunteer efforts and City and County funding, the Florida Community Design Center, Inc. After serving as Executive Director for several years I remained on the Board, organizing exhibits, events, and walking tours to help our community become educated about local environmental design issues, and to provide a forum for informed discussions.

When I accepted the deanship of the School of Architecture at the University of Virginia, I took my passion for community design with me. Among other things, with my faculty I launched a Center for Design and Health and a Community Design and Research Center, and started the university's first interdisciplinary minor, in sustainability. I was invited to serve on the boards of directors of the Charlottesville Community Design Center, and Charlottesville Tomorrow, among other boards. I invented and co-taught a course on design entrepreneurship, drawing on expertise in U Va's business schools and our alumni base across the country.

Since returning to Gainesville, I have continued to use my professional expertise to serve the community. I have worked with friends and colleagues to support entrepreneurship and business skills development, with a focus on East Gainesville, known as the "Gainesville Homegrown Business + Entrepreneurship" effort. As a returning, visiting professor, at UF, I taught an interdisciplinary studio on neighborhood-scale infrastructure, which allowed me to learn how the City's networks of infrastructures work. More recently I have researched the variety of issues emerging around national affordable housing proposals, and presented my research to local community groups.

I am a licensed architect. I know how to read and understand architectural drawings, and how to envision the written language of planning—land use, zoning, comprehensive planning—in built form. Like learning any language, it takes a long time—years—to learn the spatial language of environmental design. This is the language I learned myself, one I have taught to generations of architecture students. To test my own assumptions and to test the wisdom of emerging trends, over my nearly four decades in practice, and as an academic architect, I have traveled the world looking at towns and cities to learn how architectural and urban proposals play out over time.

I hope to contribute these experiences and professional skills to the City of Gainesville Plan Board.
