Solid Waste Programs Curbside Collection

```
First implemented
```

City: 1973

County:

subscription service – 1977

mandatory service - 1984

Joint City/County waste hauler bidding: 1989

Saved City \$1.4 M

Saved County \$1.1 M

Implementation of recycling program: 1989

Pay-As-You-Throw (PAYT): 1994



Solid Waste Programs Disposal

Early 1980s: Regional solid waste master plan recommended single regional landfill

1988: County opened its first lined bio-reactor cell at SW Landfill

1995: Site Echo (Balu Forest) added to County Comprehensive

Plan as future solid waste site

1997: County Commission chose Transfer Station over Bio-

Reactor Landfill Municipal Solid Waste composting

1998: SW landfill closed



Solid Waste Programs Disposal

May 1998: County & City entered into Interlocal agreement

County would provide "environmentally responsible solid waste management services"

City would use the County's "designated facilities for management and disposal" of solid waste

Dec. 1998: Leveda Brown Environmental Park & Transfer Station opened

1998: County enters into Interlocal Agreement with New River Regional Landfill for disposal

2018: Agreement with New River up for renewal and City Interlocal agreement



Disposal System Options

Publicly owned landfills
Privately owned landfills
Waste to Energy Plant

County preparing RFP for disposal options.



Expand recycling and resource recovery to meet State of Florida 75% Recycling Goal

- Currently at 61% Recycling Rate
 - Residential, commercial, yard trash and construction demolition debris
- Evaluate Organics Recycling Options
- Expand source separated recycling



Expand County owned and operated Materials Recovery Facility

- County assumed operation of private MRF in December 2014
- County operates in the positive despite commodity market crash
- Proposal to upgrade equipment to
 - maximize efficiency, recover more materials, increase revenue, reduce costs



Expand Public Education and Outreach

- Residents
- Commercial entities
- Schools
- University of Florida
- Santa Fe College
- Civic and Community Groups



Resource Recovery Park – Economic Development Project

- Adjacent to Leveda Brown Transfer Station
- 35 developable acres
- County provides infrastructure
- Private waste based businesses
- Potential for 200-300 jobs creation
