**SUBJECT:** Modification to Environmental Ordinance (110076) item on June 21<sup>st</sup> CC agenda

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In response to a request from Commissioner Chase, additional backup material for Ordinance 110076 is being added. The new material includes: a table showing listed species of concern and a map/table showing East Gainesville parcels greater than 5 acres in size.

The Listed Species of Concern to City of Gainesville Parks, Recreation & Cultural Affairs table shows examples of listed species of concern. This is being provided to illustrate listed species that could be located in Alachua County and that may be subject to the proposed Natural and Archaeological Resources (NAR) Protection ordinance or are already protected by federal and state laws.

The map and table of East Gainesville parcels illustrate improved and unimproved parcels greater than 5 acres in size. The Strategic Ecosystem is also overlaid on the map.

There are 60 unimproved parcels in East Gainesville that meet the > 5 acre threshold. Unimproved parcels are the ones most likely to be impacted by the NAR ordinance. Of those 60 parcels, 23 (38%) are in public ownership or otherwise preserved. The remaining 37 parcels represent 1,281.3 acres. In reviewing those 37 parcels, 17 are owned by 4 owners (East Gainesville Development (6); Hawes (3); Gainesville Development (4); and Demetree, recently annexed area in the southeast (4)). Those 17 parcels represent 66.7% of the unimproved land area acreage.
