Brooke Rich alleges that she was involved in an automobile accident with a City vehicle on December 11, 2012 on NW 39th Avenue, in Gainesville. Brooke Rich claims to have suffered bodily injury, including permanent injury to the body as a whole within a reasonable degree of medical probability, as well as aggravation of a preexisting condition, including pain and suffering of both a physical and mental nature, disability, physical impairment, disfigurement, mental anguish, inconvenience, loss of capacity for the enjoyment of life, expense of medical and nursing care and treatment, and loss of ability to lead and enjoy a normal life. Ms. Rich seeks money damages in excess of \$15,000.

140829. Transportation Allowance for Elected Officials (B)

MODIFICATION - Changed text file language.

Explanation: During the March 5, 2015 City Commission meeting, the Commission referred a discussion of the transportation allowance for elected officials to the Legislative and Organizational Policy Committee.

In accordance with current Finance procedures and IRS regulations, City employees may submit local travel mileage reimbursement for using their personal vehicle to conduct City business. This may include attending meetings away from their normal work location, picking up supplies from a vendor, visiting project sites, etc. Each employee requesting reimbursement is required to submit a form to their timekeeper that includes the date, the destination, number of miles driven, and the business purpose. The form should indicate approval from their immediate supervisor. The timekeeper will enter the number of miles x the rate into the time entry system under payroll code DMLG. Reimbursement will be included on the employees' paycheck as a

taxable miscellaneous benefit at the IRS rate, currently 57.5 cents per mile. The timekeeper is required to keep the form on file for audit purposes. Commuting from home to work and work to home is not eligible for local travel reimbursement.

Charter Officers and employees whose employment contract includes a vehicle allowance are not eligible for local travel reimbursement.

City Commissioner salaries as specified in Sec 2-66 of the City Code does not currently provide for a vehicle allowance. Addition of a vehicle allowance would require an ordinance change. However, City policies and procedures do apply to City Commissioners. Hence, City Commissioners may also submit reimbursement for local travel. Commissioners should submit a form (sample attached) to Clerk of the Commission staff including date, destination, number of miles and purpose of trip to request mileage reimbursement. Reimbursement will be included on their bi-weekly paycheck, taxable under IRS rules. As with other City employees, commuting to and from home is not eligible.

Committee members took no action on this agenda item at the April 14, 2015 Legislative and Organizational Policy Committee meeting since City Commissioners are currently governed by IRS travel policies.

This is a request for the City Commission to hear a status report on negotiations/issues surrounding Lot #10 and provide appropriate direction. **ESTIMATED ORAL PRESENTATION 10 MINUTES**

Explanation: On March 5, 2015, the City Commission approved staff's recommended ranking of firms regarding an RFP process associated with the development of Lot #10. In addition, staff was authorized to negotiate a Contract for Sale and Purchase, a Disposition and Development Agreement and other related documents with Horizon Hospitality Management.

Since this time, staff has met internally on issues regarding the framework for the negotiation and has had several conversations with Horizon Hospitality Management, its authorized representatives and other relevant parties.

The focus of negotiations at this point has been on: Business, Use and Urban Form Terms. Under Business Terms, parking considerations have been paramount and are inclusive of: capacity, financial and

operational issues.

Fiscal Note: The business terms associated with Horizon Hospitality Management include: 1) An offer of \$760,000 for the purchase of Lot #10 (the appraised market value); and, 2) A proposed revenue sharing agreement regarding use of available parking spaces in the City's Downtown Parking Garage.

This item is a request for the City Commission to hear a report on the Dignity Village review.

Estimated Presentation Time is 20 Minutes

Explanation: This item supports City Commission Strategic Initiative 3.1: Continue Implementation of the 10-Year Plan to End Homelessness.

> This is an update on actions taken to date regarding the review of Dignity Village. As there are not currently many government-run homeless camping facilities in the United States, staff was directed to research and identify other such facilities across the country to determine what guidelines, rules, and regulations are being used to manage such facilities. Staff was also directed to conduct stakeholders meetings (Alachua County Coalition for the Homeless and Hungry [ACCHH] management, Dignity Village residents, the Oversight Board Workgroup and local business owners) to get their input and feedback on rules, regulations, and guidelines that would best govern the property. This document is submitted to the Gainesville City Commission and will be used as a basis for future discussions and policy decision making.

Fiscal Note: At this time the City is currently spending funds on 4 port-a-lets at Dignity Village. The cost to date is approximately \$2,630 and is being paid by Facilities Management funds.

Appointment of a Chair and Chair Pro Tem of the Gainesville Community Redevelopment Agency Board (NB) MODIFICATION - Added item.

Explanation: It was brought to the attention of the City Attorney's Office that at the recent Community Redevelopment Agency Board member training conducted by the Florida Redevelopment Association (FRA), FRA staff stated that the City Commission, not the CRA Board, is required to appoint the Chair and Vice-Chair of a CRA. The City Attorney's Office researched the matter and confirmed that the Attorney General of Florida in a written opinion issued in 1991 stated that "the appointment of the chairman and vice chairman [of the CRA Board] by the governing board of the municipality is statutorily prescribed" and that "the community redevelopment agency has not been granted the authority to appoint its chairman or vice chairman." The Attorney General concluded

"[a]ccordingly, it is my opinion that the city commission must designate the chairman and vice chairman of the community redevelopment agency, regardless of whether the commission has designated itself as the community redevelopment agency." In order to be consistent with this legal guidance from the Attorney General and the FRA, the City Attorney's Office recommends that the City Commission appoint the Chair and Chair Pro Tem for the CRA Board for 2015/2016 and each year thereafter.

RECOMMENDATION

The City Commission: Appoint a Chair and Chair Pro Tem for the Gainesville Community Redevelopment Agency for 2015/2016.

Resolution for an Urban and Community Forestry Grant Application and Memorandum of Agreement - Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services for an Urban Forest Master Plan (NB)

This item is a request for the City Commission to adopt a Resolution authorizing the City Manager to execute an Urban and Community Forestry Grant Application and Memorandum of Agreement between the City of Gainesville, Florida and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services for an Urban Forest Master Plan.

Explanation: This is the Resolution supporting the application for The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services funds an Urban and Community Forest Grant Program. The purpose of the grant program is to provide financial assistance to initiate or enhance local urban and community forestry programs and improve the urban environment within the State of Florida.

The grant program requires a 50-50 match and provides up to \$30,000 to local governments for a variety of urban forestry projects including urban forest master plans.

If awarded, the funding would be used to contract with a consultant to create an urban forest master plan, including a canopy coverage analysis and recommendations to meet comprehensive goals and objectives.

Fiscal Note: There is a 50% match required for the Urban and Community Forestry Grant. The grant request is for \$30,000 and the \$30,000 match will be provided through the Urban Forestry Section's contractual budget for FY 2015 (\$15,000) and FY16 (\$15,000).

An ordinance amending the Future Land Use Map of the City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan by changing the land use category of approximately 4.4 acres of property generally located northeast of the intersection of Williston Road and SE 16th Avenue, as more specifically described in this ordinance, from Residential Medium-Density (RM) to Conservation (CON); providing directions to the City Manager; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing clause; and providing an effective date.

Explanation: PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DEPARTMENT STAFF REPORT

This ordinance will amend the Future Land Use Map of the City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan by changing the land use category of approximately 4.4 acres of property located northeast of the intersection of Williston Road and SE 16th Avenue from Residential Medium-Density (RM) to Conservation (CON). The subject property is owned by Alachua County and is currently undeveloped, with no current plan for development. The property is part of the Paynes Prairie Sweetwater Preserve, which is a 113.5-acre preserve that was purchased in 2006 as part of the Alachua County Forever (ACF) land acquisition program.

The subject property is part of the nature preserve, which is intended to conserve, protect, and enhance the natural resources on the land and to provide for public outdoor recreation that is compatible with the conservation, protection and enhancement of the site. The preserve is generally located north of Paynes Prairie Preserve State Park, south of the Evergreen Cemetery, west of Boulware Springs Park, and east of Williston Road. The 4.4 acre portion of the property that is within city limits is the northernmost piece of the preserve property.

This ordinance is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and will apply the most appropriate land use designation on this property and will match as closely as possible the Alachua County land use and zoning designations (i.e., Preservation) that have been applied to the bulk of the adjacent property. The city is proposing Conservation because this land use designation identifies areas environmentally unsuited to urban development, provides permanent buffers between land uses, and assigns areas used for passive recreation and nature parks. Conservation uses on this property will support and expand the natural resource base and recreational assets associated with the extensive parklands and nature preserves existing in this area of Gainesville and Alachua County, and ensure the best option for maintenance and enhancement of the resource values intended for protection under the City's Comprehensive Plan and land development regulations.

Planning Division staff has recommended approval of this ordinance. After public notice was published in the Gainesville Sun on October 7, 2014, the City Plan Board held a public hearing on October 23, 2014, and voted 5-0 to recommend adoption of this ordinance.

CITY ATTORNEY MEMORANDUM

This proposed amendment to the Comprehensive Plan involves a use of 10 acres or fewer and qualifies as a small-scale development amendment. The City Commission may adopt small-scale development amendments with a single public hearing.

Within 30 days following the City's adoption of this amendment, any affected person may file a petition with the State Division of Administrative Hearings to request a hearing to challenge the compliance of this amendment with Chapter 163, Florida Statutes. If challenged within 30 days after adoption, this amendment shall not become effective until the state land planning agency or the Administration Commission issues a final order determining that the adopted amendment is in compliance with Chapter 163, Florida Statutes. If unchallenged, this amendment shall become effective 31 days after adoption.
