CA-4 <u>210263.</u> Little Hatchet Creek Stabilization (B)

Explanation: This item is a request for the City Commission to approve the guaranteed maximum price (GMP) of \$1,419,415 for construction of Little Hatchett Creek Stabilization facilities with Wharton-Smith, Inc. Due to the level of difficulty of constructing facilities in the Little Hatchet Creek stream bed, Public Works recommends the use of the City's Construction Manager at Risk contracts to accomplish this work. Wharton-Smith has provided pre-construction services during the design process. The work will include construction of a retaining wall and installation of a grade control structure.

Little Hatchett Creek is subject to stream channel erosion. The project will stabilize the creek bank with an engineered wall system and protect the Airport Helicopter Hanger from failure into the creek bed. Stream bank failure and channel incision has exposed the Hawthorn geologic feature that contains phosphate. Erosion of this material contributes nutrient pollutants to Newnans Lake. The water quality benefit of this project is estimated to be the removal of 4,723 pounds of total phosphorus per year. The project will achieve the City of Gainesville's required total phosphorus nutrient reduction under the Orange Creek Basin Management Action Plan for Newnans Lake.

Strategic Connection

This item is connected to Goal 2: Sustainable Community in the City's Strategic Plan and is a regular priority item.

Fiscal Note: Funding for this project in the amount of \$1,419,415 is available through the Fiscal Year 2022 Stormwater Management Utility Capital Improvement Budget, the undesignated Stormwater Management Utility fund balance, and a \$505,000 contribution from the Florida Department of Transportation. This contribution is established within the 2017 Interlocal Agreement for Allocation and Implementation of the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Program Requirements and for Basin Management Action Plan Projects.

CA-5 210286. Approve the Ranking for Federal Lobbyist Services (B)

Explanation: The City is currently under contract for Federal lobbying services with Van Scoyoc Associates, Inc. Last year, City staff asked the City Commission to extend the contract for Van Scoyoc Associates, Inc. for one additional year beginning October 1, 2020 through September 30, 2021 due to COVID-19 and the State and local Emergency Orders. At that time, staff believed that it would be difficult to retain a firm to provide federal lobbying services who understood the City's needs, therefore, staff requested an extension of the existing contract. Staff notified the City Commission that the City would issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) for Federal Lobbying Services for FY 2022. The Procurement division issued an RFP for Federal Lobbying Services on May 12, 2021. Proposals were due by June 10, 2021. The Procurement division distributed two proposals to the evaluation committee on June 16, 2021 to review and evaluate the proposals. The evaluation committee consisted of two employees from General Government and one employee from General Regional Utilities (GRU).

On June 28, 2021, the evaluation committee provided the official scores for the written proposals. The evaluation committee made the recommendation that the two lobbying firms move forward to the next round: oral presentations. Oral presentations were conducted on August 4, 2021 and based on the criteria, the firms were ranked as follows: #1 Van Scoyoc Associates, Inc. and # 2 Alcalde & Faye, Ltd. On August 4, 2021 reference checks were conducted and both firms received an overall excellent rating. The evaluation committee recommends Van Scoyoc Associates, Inc. as the first ranked firm and Alcalde & Faye, Ltd as the second ranked firm for Federal Lobbyist Services for the City of Gainesville.

CA-6 <u>201163.</u> Amended and Restated Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restriction for Heartwood Community (B)

Explanation: At the January 4, 2018, City Commission meeting the staff recommendation was approved and authorized the Mayor to execute the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions for the Heartwood Community (Declaration), and authorized the City Manager to record the Declaration in the Public Records of Alachua County.

Accordingly, on January 19, 2018, the Declaration was recorded in the Official Records (Instrument #3101857) Book 4570, Page 1751. Also approved during the January 4, 2018 meeting were the Heartwood subdivision plat and recording of the same, the names listed in the Articles of Incorporation of the Heartwood Homeowners' Association, Inc., to serve as officers of the Board, authorization for the Mayor to execute the Articles of Incorporation of the Heartwood Homeowners' Association, Inc., authorization for the City Attorney to file the Articles of Incorporation with the Secretary of State, and direction to CRA staff to bring an item to the City Commission to establish guidelines and a budget for CRA staff to act as the Board of Directors and Officers of the HOA.

Since that time, GCRA Staff has been working with the Heartwood Homeowners' Association outside counsel, Clayton and McCulloh, to review and clarify some of the clauses stated in the original Declaration of Covenants document. These changes were necessary due to the

CRA/GCRA acting as Developer of the Heartwood Neighborhood. The redlined document with proposed changes is included as backup to this agenda item.

Proposed changes focus on areas of the Declaration that needed clarification, correct scrivener's errors, and make changes to the document to alleviate excessive application fees/deposits that added constraints to Homeowners for minor changes such as paint choices and repairs to their homes. Outside legal counsel recommended these fees be removed as they are not normally included in Homeowner Association Declarations as a matter of practice.

Fiscal Note: There is no fiscal impact to the budget at this time.

AGENDA UPDATE - REMOVE ITEM

Explanation: On August 17, 2021, the City of Gainesville executed a Letter of Intent with Jose Peruyero, Jr., President of How Bazar Co., for the purpose of renting the southern space of the SW Downtown Parking Garage, known as 60 Southwest 2nd Street. Suite 60 consists of 2,822 square feet. How Bazar is a local, diverse, minority-owned retail establishment that specializes in vintage clothing from around the world, and was previously a tenant in the Seagle Building located in Downtown Gainesville.

Years 3 - 6 priced at \$11.91 / SF with a 2% Annual Increase

CA-8 210349. Agenda and Meeting Management System (B)

Explanation: Since the late 1990's, the City of Gainesville has maintained a contractual agreement with Granicus, LLC for agenda and meeting management services. The Office of the City Clerk decided to bid out the service to ensure that the city is utilizing the best solution for operations and to expand the organization's agenda management and meeting capabilities.

On May 12, 2021, the Clerk's Office issued a Request for Proposal (CCLK-210044-MS) for an Agenda and Meeting Management System. All solicitations were due to the Procurement division on June 9, 2021. Five firms submitted proposals. An evaluation committee consisting of two representatives of the Clerk's Office, a member of Broadcast Services and IT representatives from General Government and Gainesville Regional Utilities reviewed the proposals. The committee recommended inviting the following three firms to the second round of the interview process (oral presentations): Provox System, Inc.; Granicus, LLC; and eSCRIBE Software Ltd.

The evaluation committee met for oral presentations on August 11, 2021

and August 13, 2021. At a public meeting on August 13, 2021, the committee scored and ranked the firms. The firm eSCRIBE Software Ltd. was ranked the number one bidder and Granicus, LLC as second for the Agenda and Meeting Management Services.

eSCRIBE's proposed software solution will benefit neighbors and community-builders by increasing efficiency of agenda management and meeting administration; improving access to public information; and ensuring compliance with ADA requirements. The cloud-based product will reduce IT resources needed for maintenance and support. Also, the software is capable of integrating with the City's existing systems, including Microsoft applications and the City Clerk's records management system.

Fiscal Note: The City's current contract for Agenda and Meeting Management Services is \$64,991.75. The City will negotiate a contract with the bidder not to exceed \$76,830.00 for year one, including up to \$28,490.00 in one-time implementation costs and \$48,340 in recurring annual subscription fees, saving the city approximately \$16,000 annually after the first year. At the end of the contract period, upon satisfactory performance, the parties may agree to extend the contact for up to four additional one-year periods.

Approval and Authorization to Execute Two Lease Amendments to the Original Lease (B)

This item is a request to Approve and Authorize the Execution of two Lease Amendments with Teledyne FLIR Detection, Inc., a Delaware Corporation.

Explanation: Over the past three years, since the Prioria bankruptcy, the Catalyst Building has been jointly occupied by three separate tenants: the City of Gainesville, University of Florida (FIBER) program and Altavian, a local drone company, which was bought by Teledyne FLIR Detection, Inc. The latter two tenants executed three year leases for 7,500 square feet and 10,000 square feet respectively (in August/September, 2018), and they expire on August 31, 2021.

Terms of the Lease include the following:

Two Year Base Lease Term (for the entire building - 22,000 square feet)

Priced at \$14.00 / SF with a 3% Annual Increase

Two Options to Renew for a Two Year Term Each at Fair Market Value

No Tenant Improvement Allowance and No Rent Abatement

City will provide expanded parking spaces for a total of 100 spaces (paved and striped)

Tenant pays Property Tax (Estimated at \$1,350 per month) and Sales Tax (6.5%)

AGENDA UPDATE - REMOVE ITEM

Explanation: The Black on Black Crime Task Force Violence Interrupters also known as Nspire is a culmination of multi-disciplinary professionals from the fields of Intervention and Prevention, Employment Outreach, Education, Mental Health, and Social Services, who work together to case manage to prevent violence by identifying and mediating potentially lethal conflicts in the community (violence detection and interruption), and follow up to ensure that the conflict does not reignite. The mission is to engage leaders in the community as well as community residents, local business owners, faith leaders, service providers, and at-risk individuals promulgating the message that violence should not be viewed as normal but as a behavior that can be changed. Ultimately, modifying behaviors and changing potentially violent trajectories.

The target areas within communities is to mediate disturbances, develop trusting relationships with carriers of violence, introduce community resources, and advocate for safe zones such as schools, daycare centers, churches, etc. This in turn will impact re-entry and improve public safety.

This is a request to continue the program for another year and continue to expand the program.

Fiscal Note: The total amount to pay for two (2) Violence Interrupters for a total of \$105,000.00 and will be funded by freezing two (2) police officer positions in FY22.

RECOMMENDATION

The City Commission authorize the City Manager to execute the agreement subject to approval by the City Attorney as to form and legality and approve the expenditure as outlined in the agreement.

Explanation: At the August 23, 2021 City Commission Special Meeting, Commissioner At-Large Gail Johnson read a statement expressing her intent to resign as a Commissioner for Seat B. She stated that her last City Commission meeting would be September 23, 2021 and that she would leave office on September 30, 2021. In accordance with Section 2.04 of the City Charter, if a vacancy occurs on the City Commission more than six months from the next General Election, a special election shall be held within 60 days.

FY21 Agenda Adoption of Zero Waste Strategy Report and **Implementation Plan (B)**

Explanation: On August 15, 2019, the City Commission approved executing an interlocal agreement with Alachua County to develop a joint strategic Zero Waste Plan. By working cooperatively with common goals, the County and the City can move toward Zero Waste more efficiently.

> Alachua County executed an agreement with Kessler Consulting Inc. to provide the analysis. The City paid for half of the study, which was \$62,260.

The Zero Waste Strategy Report and Implementation Plan is designed to evaluate the County and City's existing reuse and recycling infrastructure and evaluate policies and programs in the community to maximize reuse and recovery.

City and County Community Builders have identified five guiding principles for evaluating Zero Waste strategies: (1) Keep Resources Local; (2) Foster Job Growth; (3) Emphasize and Support Upstream Solutions (4) Mitigate Climate Change; and, (5) Ensure Environmental Justice and Equality of Service.

Kessler, with input from stakeholders, has developed a three-phase Implementation Plan for Zero Waste strategies. These strategies address food waste recovery, construction and demolition debris recycling, and the promotion of reuse. Because of the work of Community Builders and the Zero Waste Subcommittee, many Phase I strategies are already underway.

This item requests the City Commission to hear an update regarding the development of a Utility Assistance Program.

Explanation: On July 19, 2021, the City Commission adopted Resolution #210125, which states that the Commission will consider increasing electric and wastewater rates for Fiscal Years 2022 through 2027; and, the Commission will consider developing and funding utility assistance programs to mitigate the financial impacts to those most negatively impacted by those rate increases.

On February 24, 2015, Gainesville Regional Utilities (GRU) executed a Memorandum of Understanding with local non-profit agencies Catholic

Charities, Gainesville Community Ministry, and The Salvation Army to manage a program called Project Share. The purpose of that program is to provide financial assistance to GRU customers who qualify for emergency support due to a financial hardship. GRU uses multiple funding sources, including voluntary contributions from its customers and employees, to support Project Share. The agencies use 100% of the funds for the financial assistance program.

Staff is currently researching options to determine how to fund and manage a similar Utility Assistance Program, including exploring potential partnerships with third-party providers. Additionally, a program budget and funding source will have to be identified to implement the program.

Fiscal Note: There is no fiscal impact at this time. A future funding source will need to be determined if a program is authorized.

Ordinance No. 200038

An ordinance of the City of Gainesville, Florida, adding specified real properties owned in fee simple by the City of Gainesville to the City of Gainesville Registry of Protected Public Places; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing clause; and providing an immediate effective date.

Explanation: Section 5.09, City of Gainesville Charter, created a Registry of Protected Public Places for real properties owned in fee simple by the City that are acquired or used for conservation, recreation, or cultural purposes, and that are deemed by the City Commission to be worthy of the highest level of protection. At a public hearing the City Commission may add properties to the Registry by adopting an ordinance by a five-sevenths vote of the membership of the Commission. Once placed on the Registry, the properties may not be sold, or converted to a use that will result in a loss of values for which a property was placed on the Registry, except by a majority vote of the electors voting in a city-wide referendum election.

Six additional nature parks are proposed for listing as Phase III: 29th Road Nature Park Additions, Boulware Springs Nature Park, Colclough Pond Nature Park Additions, Forest Park Conservation Area Additions, Loblolly Woods Nature Park Additions, and Morningside Nature Park Additions. The property listing document provides legal descriptions, location maps, and a description of values for which the properties are to be protected.

This ordinance requires two hearings and will become effective immediately.

Fiscal Note: There is no cost to the City to list properties on the Registry of Protected Public Places.
