2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9	An ordinance of the City of Gainesville, Florida, amending the Code of Ordinances by creating Division 7, titled "Food Diversion"; providing directions to the codifier; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing clause; and providing an effective date and an enforcement date.			
10	WHEREAS, the City Commission finds that it is desirable to require certain commercial			
11	generators who provide food for consumption to divert food and food waste to beneficial uses,			
12	including feeding hungry people, feeding animals, industrial uses, and composting; and			
13	WHEREAS, the City Commission finds that this Ordinance is necessary to achieve food			
14	waste reduction, reduce methane in landfills, and increase composting; and			
15	WHEREAS, at least ten (10) days' notice has been given once by publication in a			
16	newspaper of general circulation notifying the public of this proposed ordinance and of public			
17	hearings in the City Hall Auditorium located on the first floor of City Hall in the City of			
18	Gainesville; and			
19	WHEREAS, public hearings were held pursuant to the notice described above at which			
20	hearings the parties in interest and all others had an opportunity to be and were, in fact, heard.			
21	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE			
22	CITY OF GAINESVILLE, FLORIDA:			
23	Section 1. The Code of Ordinance of Gainesville, Florida is hereby amended by adding			
24	Division 7 within Article III of Chapter 27, which division reads as follows. Except as amended			
25	herein, the remainder of Chapter 27 remains in full force and effect.			
26 27	DIVISION 7. – FOOD DIVERSION			
28	Sec. 27-95.5 - Mandatory commercial food waste diversion established.			

29	(a) Beginning on the dates listed below, the following commercial generators shall divert		
30	food or food waste from the waste stream unless they are granted an exemption:		
31	(1) By January 1, 2023, food retailers that occupy at least 25,000 square feet, including		
32	but not limited to grocery stores, convenience stores, meat markets, poultry		
33	markets, fish and related aquatic food markets, and produce markets.		
34	(2) By January 1, 2024, restaurants that occupy at least 4,500 square feet, businesses		
35	with a commercial kitchen(s) where the kitchen(s) occupies at least 1,000 square		
36	feet, businesses engaged in selling food to other businesses, businesses engaged in		
37	making food from one or more ingredients through processing or preparation for		
38	sale directly to the public, retailers, or wholesalers.		
39	Commercial generators which are required to divert food or food waste under this		
40	subsection shall divert food or food waste in accordance with the following hierarchy:		
41	(1) feeding hungry people;		
42	(2) feeding animals;		
43	(3) providing for industrial uses; and		
44	(4) composting.		
45	(b) Proof of participation in food waste diversion program. Upon request of the city		
46	manager or designee, a commercial generator shall, depending on whether food or food waste is		
47	diverted, provide the following as proof of compliance: 1) receipts for delivery of food to a food		
48	bank or other facility that provides food to hungry people or animals, or 2) receipts for delivery		
49	of food waste to a food waste processing facility, or produce proof of a valid and current contract		
50	with a food waste registrant.		

51 (c) Exemptions. A commercial generator may request an exemption from the requirements

52 of this section. The city manager or designee shall grant a request for an exemption if the

53 commercial generator demonstrates that it is unable to comply due to lack of available service

54 providers or facilities that accept food or food waste. An exemption request must be completed

55 every 6 months and submitted using forms provided by the city. Commercial generators shall

56 <u>be notified in writing within sixty (60) days of whether their exemption request is granted or</u>

57 <u>denied.</u>

58 Sec. 27-95.6. - Penalties for violation.

59 Unless specifically stated otherwise, the city shall enforce violations of sections 27-95.5 through

60 code enforcement proceedings, by section 1-9 of this Code of Ordinances, or seek injunctive

61 relief in a court of competent jurisdiction.

62 Section 2. It is the intention of the City Commission that the provisions of Section 1 of this
63 Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of

64 Gainesville, Florida, and that the sections and paragraphs of this Ordinance may be renumbered

65 or relettered in order to accomplish such intentions.

Section 3. If any word, phrase, clause, paragraph, section or provision of this ordinance or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, such finding shall not affect the other provisions or application of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared severable.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances, in conflict herewith are to the extent of
 such conflict hereby repealed.
