1	ORDINANCE NO. 200744
2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9	An ordinance of the City of Gainesville, Florida, amending Section 9-10 of the Code of Ordinances by creating additional requirements for candidate qualifying; providing for an additional qualifying fee or petition signatures in lieu of a qualifying fee; providing directions to the codifier; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing clause; and providing an immediate effective date.
11	WHEREAS, the City Commission wishes to impose additional requirements upon
12	candidates seeking to qualify for office to the City Commission; and
13	WHEREAS, in addition to the mandatory 1% election assessment required by section
14	99.093, Florida Statutes (2021), the City Commission wishes to add a 2% qualifying fee. In lieu
15	of paying the qualifying fee, a candidate may choose the petition process of qualifying, which
16	means the a mayoral or at-large seat candidate must collect signatures of 1% of registered voters
17	in the city and a district seat candidate must collect signatures of 0.25% of registered voters in
18	the city geographical area of the office sought; and
19	WHEREAS, the Supervisor of Elections of Alachua County is the custodian of city voter
20	registration records; and
21	WHEREAS, section 9-6 of the Code of Ordinances allows the city clerk to contract with
22	the Supervisor of Elections of Alachua County to serve as the registration and qualifying officer
23	for the city; and
24	WHEREAS, the City intends to contract with the Supervisor of Elections to perform the
25	service of verifying signatures; and
26	WHEREAS, the actual cost for the Supervisor of Elections to verify a signatures is 30
27	cents (\$0.30) per signature. The City Commission only wishes to charge candidates 10 cents
28	(\$0.10) to verify a signature as part of the petition method of qualifying. The City will fund the

29	difference between the 10 cents per signature to be paid by candidates and the actual cost of the
30	Supervisor of Elections to verify signatures; and
31	WHEREAS, this Ordinance does not create a hardship exemption for the qualifying fee
32	or petition process cost; and
33	WHEREAS, at least ten (10) days' notice has been given once by publication in a
34	newspaper of general circulation notifying the public of this proposed ordinance and of public
35	hearings in the City Hall Auditorium located on the first floor of City Hall in the City of
36	Gainesville; and
37	WHEREAS, public hearings were held pursuant to the notice described above at which
38	hearings the parties in interest and all others had an opportunity to be and were, in fact, heard.
39	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE
40	CITY OF GAINESVILLE, FLORIDA:
41	<b>Section 1.</b> Section 9-10 of Chapter 9 of the Gainesville Code or Ordinances is amended
42	to read as follows:
43	Sec. 9-10 Qualifications of candidates for city commission.
44	(a) Any person who meets the eligibility requirements described in Article II of the Charter
45	may become a candidate for the office of mayor or city commissioner of the city by filing
46	the necessary qualifying papers as provided in Florida Statutes with the registration and
47	qualifying officer for the city during the qualifying period, and complying with the
48	requirements to 1) pay the election assessment and 2) pay the qualifying fee or submit
49	petition signatures as part of the petition process.
50	(b) The qualifying period for a regular election shall coincide with the qualifying period
51	provided by general law to qualify for election to a county office.

52	(c)	Election assessment; qualifying fee; petition process.
53		(1) Election Assessment. As a condition precedent to having the candidate's name printed
54		on the ballot for such election such person shall pay to the registration and qualifying
55		officer for the city the election assessment imposed by general law, or be exempted from
56		such payment of assessment pursuant to the provisions of general law.
57		(2) Qualifying fee or petition process. Commencing with the regular election in 2024, in
58		addition to the election assessment imposed by general law, as a condition precedent to
59		having the candidate's name printed on the ballot for such election such person shall pay
60		to the registration and qualifying officer for the city a qualifying fee or submit petition
61		signatures as set forth in this section.
62		a. Qualifying fee option. In addition to the election assessment, candidates shall
63		pay to the registration and qualifying officer for the city a qualifying fee of two
64		percent of the annual salary of the office sought.
65		b. Petition process option. In lieu of payment of the qualifying fee, a candidate
66		may collect signatures of registered voters on a petition form. Candidates who
67		seek to qualify through the petition process shall comply with the following
68		requirements:
69		1. Candidates must use the petition form required by the registration and
70		qualifying officer for the city.
71		2. Signatures may not be obtained until the candidate has filed the
72		appointment of campaign treasurer and designation of campaign
73		depository pursuant to state law and are valid only for the qualifying
74		period immediately following such filings.

75	<u>3.</u>	Except as provided in subsection 4 below, candidates Candidates for at-
76		large seats or mayor must obtain the number of signatures of registered
77		voters of the city in the geographical area represented by the office sought
78		equal to at least one percent (1%) of the total number of registered voters
79		of the city that geographical area, as determined by the number of
80		registered voters in the city that geographical area in the last city regular
81		election.
82	<u>4.</u>	Candidates for district seats must obtain the number of signatures of
83		registered voters of the city equal to at least one-quarter of one percent
84		(0.25%) of the total number of registered voters of the city, as determined
85		by the number of registered voters in the city in the last city regular
86		election. If new city commission districts have not been adopted as part
87		of redistricting at least four months before the deadline to submit petition
88		signatures, candidates must obtain the number of signatures of any
89		registered voters residing anywhere within the city, regardless of district
90		boundaries, equal to at least one percent of the total number of registered
91		voters of the current district for which the candidate seeks office, as
92		determined by the number of registered voters in that current district in
93		the last city election.
94	<u>5.</u>	The candidate must submit petitions before noon of the 28th day preceding
95		the first day of the qualifying period for the office sought to the
96		registration and qualifying officer for the city. The candidate must pay in

97			advance the sum of 10 cents (\$0.10) for each signature checked to the
98			registration and qualifying officer for the city.
99		<u>6.</u>	The registration and qualifying officer for the city shall check the
100			signatures on the petitions to verify their status as voters in the city or
101			geographical area represented by the office sought, as applicable. The city
102			may contract with the Supervisor of Elections of Alachua County to
103			verify the petition signatures on behalf of the registration and qualifying
104			officer for the city. The city will bear the cost to verify signatures that
105			exceeds 10 cents (\$0.10) per signature.
106		<u>7.</u>	No later than the 7th day before the first day of the qualifying period, the
107			registration and qualifying officer for the city shall certify the number of
108			valid signatures.
109	(d)	Any person who	o is seeking election as a write-in candidate shall not be required to pay a
110		filing an electio	n assessment or qualifying fee or submit a petition. A write-in candidate
111		shall not be enti	tled to have the candidate's name printed on any ballot; however, space
112		for the candidat	e's name to be written in shall be provided on the ballot. No person may
113		qualify as a writ	te-in candidate if the person has also otherwise qualified for election to
114		such office. All	write-in candidates must submit their qualifying paperwork to the
115		registration and	qualifying officer for the city by the end of the qualifying period set out
116		above.	
117	(e)	For purposes of	determining the eligibility requirements of Article II of the Charter, a
118		person who resi	des in an area that is redistricted into another district (hereinafter the "new
119		district") shall b	be deemed to be a resident of the new district if the person resides

120	anywhere within the area that is placed	d in the new district for a period of not less	s than six	
121	months prior to the date the person qualifies to run for office.			
122	<b>Section 2</b> . It is the intention of the City Commission that the provisions of Section 1 of			
123	this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Charter and the Code of Ordinances of the			
124	City of Gainesville, Florida, and that the sec	ctions and paragraphs of this Ordinance ma	y be	
125	renumbered or relettered in order to accomplish such intentions.			
126	Section 3. If any word, phrase, cla	use, paragraph, section or provision of this	s ordinance	
127	or the application hereof to any person or o	circumstance is held invalid or unconstitut	ional, such	
128	finding shall not affect the other provision	s or applications of this ordinance that ca	n be given	
129	effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application, and to this end the			
130	provisions of this ordinance are declared severable.			
131	Section 4. All ordinances or parts	of ordinances in conflict herewith are to the	e extent of	
132	such conflict hereby repealed.			
133	Section 5. This ordinance shall become	ome effective immediately upon adoption.
