*Facilitated restorative justice conferences with 120 local justice-involved youth with additional family and community members present

*Delivered training in social-emotional learning and restorative practices to students and staff/faculty in over 12 local schools. Supported staff development of over 300 educators and administrators and conducted over twelve student/educator dialogues reaching 180 participants in middle and high schools

*Since 2020, in an ongoing partnership with UF's PK Yonge Developmental Research School, we have embedded school-wide restorative practices by training educators, staff and administrators, guiding changes to disciplinary policies and procedures, and providing direct coaching and support

*Informed and supported the adoption of restorative justice through the Student Code of Conduct for Alachua County Schools

*In all of our trainings, we promote anti-racism, diversity, equity, and inclusion principles, including trauma and resilience

*In partnership with the Gainesville Police Department, we mediated numerous community disputes and conducted restorative justice circles in ten schools.

Pandemic changes to your organization

Pandemic-related changes to priorities and goals*

Briefly explain how the COVID pandemic has changed your organization's priorities and goals.

The pandemic has revealed and exacerbated various risk factors that exist within our community. Due to COVID, our community has experienced an increase in feelings of isolation which has led to higher incidents of depression, suicide, anxiety, domestic violence, etc. This has increased the need for our work in the community, bringing people together to create mutual understanding and support. In particular, marginalized communities, as well as youth, have been disproportionately impacted due to the closure of inperson schooling and direct family services.

Our organization's priorities and goals are to reach these vulnerable populations where they are and provide the skills and resources they need to form meaningful connections with the community and effectively address conflict. In response to the increase in interpersonal conflict resulting from the pandemic, RPCP is directing resources to provide conflict resolution services to community members. To this end, we are in the process of developing and opening our Conflict Solution Hub by June 2022, where affordable (and oftentimes free) mediation, restorative justice circles, conflict coaching, and community dialogues will be held. Accessibility is a major priority, therefore our services will include going out into the community as well as offering virtual services.

We will prioritize direct service programs for youth that will increase self-esteem, a sense of belonging, and develop social-emotional learning skills. One of our goals is to empower disenfranchised students who weren't able to attend school or socialize with their friends and may have difficulty appropriately managing the stressors in their lives that create acute anxiety.

In all our programs, we prioritize services that promote racial equity, such as our police-youth dialogue program, restorative practices in schools, and our work within the criminal justice community as well as incarcerated individuals.

Pandemic-related changes to your organization's operations*

Please describe how your operations have changed during the pandemic from a staffing and service delivery standpoint.

Due to the COVID pandemic, we could not provide direct in-person services. All of our programs had to be put on hold. Many of our programs' curricula had to be revised to allow for a virtual platform. Some of our most impactful partnership programs, including those based in law enforcement agencies, schools, prisons, and the Department of Juvenile Justice system had to be paused indefinitely. Further, many of our collaborative community partners suspended their programs, which limited our capacity to offer our services.

COVID restrictions made hosting our annual fundraising events impossible. Our annual Gala brings in over 200 people and thus our ability to raise funds and educate people about what we provide to the community decreased. Additionally, we were unable to collect revenue from our fee-based programs as they were suspended.

We created virtual programming through the RPCP Peace Collaborative. These free programs on ZOOM covering a variety of subjects attracted over 2,500 people and gave them a platform to be seen, heard, and understood within a community as well as an opportunity to increase their toolbox and inner resources through many of RPCP's programs. Based on feedback, it helped improve the mental health of local community members and was educational in areas of women's health, trauma and resilience building, racial and social justice, dialogues, issues with law enforcement, the political climate, fear, and heartache.

During the pandemic, we lost a majority of our staff, and since there was no in-person programming, there was no reason at the time to fill the vacancies. We moved out of our office space and the remaining staff members transitioned to work from home.

To honor our contractual obligations with P.K. Yonge Developmental Research School, we adapted our training delivery method to a virtual platform. We successfully trained all K-12 faculty and educators in Restorative Practices and continued to offer individualized coaching.

Impact

Description of Need as Specifically Related to Coronavirus*

Please provide a description of how your organization continues to be impacted by the coronavirus pandemic, operationally and/or programmatically.

Since the coronavirus pandemic seems to have calmed down and we are able to go back to in-person programming and events, it doesn't mean that we are able to go back to the way it was. The whole picture has changed dramatically. It will take some time for all of us to "start-up" and produce at the level or beyond what was before. We need it more than ever, but this will require much effort and time into reconnecting with the public and our partners.

Connecting our resources and services with community members who would benefit from them remains a constant challenge. This challenge has only been exacerbated by the pandemic, therefore, we are developing a comprehensive outreach plan to connect our services with partners and community members to increase utilization of tools, strategies, and resources.

As we return from our absence, we have to re-introduce ourselves to community members and agencies. Importantly, the heads of most of the agencies that we have worked with have changed. We must develop new relationships, introduce our programs, services and build trust (thankfully we have a track record). There is a new Sheriff, State Attorney, Chief of the Department of Juvenile Justice, Superintendent of Schools, School Board members, Children's Trust of Alachua County Executive Director, Chief of Police, and more. Oftentimes, new leaders bring new staff and they too may be unfamiliar with our work. Considering the fact that these are some of our important partners, it is obvious that it will take some for us to get back into these previously established relationships.

Additionally, we will need to re-establish programmatic partnerships with local organizations such as Project YouthBuild, Aces in Motion (AIM), Girls Place, 4H Club, Welcoming Gainesville, Peaceful Paths, Partnership for Strong Families, Pace Center for Girls, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Boys & Girls Club, Greater Duval, Resilience School, and AMI Kids.

We recently hired a full-time "Operations Specialist" and a half-time "Training and Outreach Specialist". We are in the process of hiring a full-time "Youth Intervention Specialist" who will complete our hiring needs for the time being.

Our organization is currently moving into a new, unfinished office building. To meet the community need described above, we will also be designing and furnishing a new Conflict Solution Hub providing direct conflict resolution services to community members which will require the development of a new facilitation process and model.

Our services target at-risk youth, justice-involved individuals, and vulnerable racial/ethnic minority populations. Much of our work serves residents of East Gainesville and is provided at no cost.

Our programs are designed to address the disproportionate minority contact of communities of color by law enforcement. We address disparities involved in the school-to-prison pipeline, school disciplinary practices, and community-based trauma.
