






CHIP Needs Assessment Key Results

Most Important Health Problems to Address:

- 1. Mental Health including suicide
- 2. Aging problems including mobility, dementia, and arthritis
- Obesity, chronic disease, stroke, and high blood pressure
- 4. Environmental quality
- 5. Gun related injuries



Children who did not get medical care



- Could not afford
- Had trouble scheulding an appt
- Did not know where to go

22% do not know how to swim 19% did not get dental care when needed 23% did not get mental health care when needed

30% under 6 do not ride in a car seat or booster seat 41% have never had any gun safety education 26% of adults did not get medical care when needed

26% of adults did not get dental care when needed 27% of adults did not get mental health care when needed



20% had food insecurities



3 respondents lived in their cars, on the street, or in a shelter



5% had their utilities shut off

Another 5 % did not only because of COVID Relief Assistance
