Feb. 19th City Commission Actions

- Approved funding for projects currently underway
- Directed the City Manager to work with advocacy groups for 1) Cone Park track and multi-purpose fields, 2) Northeast Pool heating/cooling, and 3) Northwest Soccer
 Complex to determine if these groups would be able to fund ongoing operating costs associated with these projects
- Directed staff to return to the Commission to provide an update on discussions with advocacy groups and to seek funding approval for additional projects



Feb. 19th City Commission Actions (continued)

- Decided to hold off on providing direction about the set-aside of \$1,150,000 to cover operating expenses for those projects with estimated annual operating costs of \$50,000 or less
- Authorized the Clerk of the Commission to advertise for City of Gainesville members of the Wild Spaces & Public Places Citizen Oversight Committee



Wild Spaces Public Places CIP Status Update

- Project Management
 - Aleta Cozart
 - RFQ for Architectural and Engineering Services
- Citizen Oversight Committee
 - Approved March 24, 2009 by Board of Alachua County Commissioners
 - Total of 8 members to serve on committee
 - 2 citizens-at-large and 1 alternate to be appointed by City of Gainesville;

Cone Park Track and Multipurpose Field and Stadium

- Cone Park Track, Field & Stadium was ranked 20th of 23 projects
- Initial meeting with project stakeholders

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- Looking at costs of construction and equipment and potential cost savings
- Reviewed estimated operating expense projections and will be coming back with a proposal showing substantial reductions
- GSC has agreed to assume operation and maintenance for 3 years with option to extend
- In June the stakeholders will be prepared to submit a final proposal to Parks, Recreation & Cultural Affairs

NE Pool Geo-Thermal Heating/Cooling Project

- Pool heating project was ranked 22nd of 23
- Pool Visioning Team developed and has been meeting routinely
- Previous improvements addressed through capital funds with input from Pool Team
- Access and operational scheduling
- Additional improvements to be funded:
 - Facility improvements
 - Heating/cooling



Recently Completed (2007-2008) Pool Capital Improvements

- New stainless steel gutter, ladders and handicap rail at NE
- New pool liner at NE and Westside (Mickle's lining was replaced in 2002)
- New bulkhead at NE
- New sand filtration system at NE
- New lane lines (short course and long course), reels, and covers at NE, Westside and Mickle
- New starting blocks at NE
- New signage and landscaping at NE

Current Operating Season

- May thru November, weather permitting, which allows the local high schools to continue to train the swimmers and divers that qualify for the State Swimming and Diving Championship (typically held during the first two weeks of November).
- Hours during peak operating season:
 - Monday-Friday: 6 a.m. -7 p.m.
 - Saturday: 11 a.m. 6 p.m.
 - Sunday: 12 p.m. 5 p.m.



Scheduled (2009-2010) Pool Capital Improvements

- New splash pad at NE & Westside
- Pool deck resurfacing at NE & Westside
- New benches at NE & Westside
- New shade structures at NE & Westside
- New slide pump at NE
- Renovation of existing locker rooms at NE & Westside
- New interior pool lights at NE
- New pool slide at Westside



NE Pool Heating/Cooling

How the geo-thermal heating unit works:

- A water-to-water heat pump:
 - Heat is transferred from one place (the source water) to another (the pool water)
 - The two bodies of water never mix



What are the benefits of Geo-Thermal?

Economical

- Greatest return on investment pays for itself from savings vs. gas
 - Typically 70-90% cheaper to operate than gas
- Green Responsible
 - Environmentally friendly alternative to gas
 - Heat transfer, not heat generation
 - Minimal carbon footprint
 - No toxic or noxious emissions



What are the benefits of Geo-Thermal? (continued)

Reliable

- Heats like gas
- Unlike solar, needs no sun
- Unlike air source, not affected by air temperature
- Ability to cool in the summer

Durable

- Longest serviceable life expectancy of all heating options
- Corrosion resistant
- Easy to maintain



What are the Benefits to the Community?

- A year-round heated pool will:
 - Address the public need for year-round access
 - Promote lifelong fitness and wellness
 - Enable more aquatics programs
 - Improve water safety through community education
 - Stimulate the local economy through swim meets and tournaments
 - Provide employment opportunities
 - Promote aquatic health



Projected Revenue

- Anticipated to be \$40,000 to \$50,000 in Year 1, from the following activities:
 - High Tide Aquatics
 - Swim Team, Learn-to-Stroke and Learn-to-Swim clinics, inclusion of PK Yonge's swim team in the off-season
 - MAKOS Swim Club
 - Gaviatas Synchronized Swimming
 - Practice Space, (1) 2-day Synchronized Swimming Meet

Projected Operating Expenses

- Turn-key projects
 - **•** \$360,000
 - \$282,000 Heaters, Wells, Installation, Labor
 - \$13,000 Blanket Reels Uniforms: \$1,000
 - \$65,000 Pool Blankets Chemicals: \$15,000

- \$77,300
- Additional utilities (Oct-May: unrestricted heating to maintain pool at 80 degrees): \$41,300
- Personnel: \$20,000



Operating Expenses and Projected Revenue Over 4 Years

Total Projected 1st Year Operating Expenses = \$77,300

Total Projected 1st Year Pool Revenue = \$45,000

- Year 1: need WSPP ½ Cent Sales Tax @ \$32,300
- Year 2: revenue increases by 20% to \$54,000 expenses increase by 3% to \$79,600: need WSPP @ \$25,600
- Year 3: revenue increases by 20% to \$64,800 expenses increase by 3% to \$82,000: need WSPP @ \$17,200
- Year 4: revenue increases by 20% to \$77,760 expenses increase by 3% to \$84,460: need WSPP @ \$6,700



Suggested Winter Pool Schedule

- Monday-Friday
 - 4 hours late afternoon/early evening
 - (swim teams, public swim and lap swim)
- Saturday
 - 6 hours
 - (swim teams, public swim and lap swim)
- Sunday
 - Closed



NW Soccer Complex

- NW Soccer Complex project was ranked 23rd of the 23 projects
- Park development estimated at \$1,000,000
- Estimated operating and staffing cost at \$260,000
- Status of stakeholders meeting and proposal

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Original Revenue Projections

Original Projections for Park Improvements and Land Acquisition

- \$14,181,502 (original estimated revenues)
- \$2,836,300 Sensitive Land Acquisition (based on 20% of City allocation)
- \$11,345,202 Park Improvements and Development
- * \$2,496,739 (17.6056%) is the minimum required expenditure for Land Acquisition per the Interlocal Agreement

Updated Revenue Projections

Updated Conservative Projections for Park Improvements and Land Acquisition

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- \$10,920,084 (March 2009 estimate)
- \$2,184,017 Sensitive Land Acquisition (based on 20% of City allocation)
- \$8,736,067 Park Improvements and Development
- * \$1,922,546 (17.6056%) is the minimum required expenditure for Land Acquisition per the Interlocal Agreement

Recommendations

- 1. Approve funding to proceed with capital projects 1-9, 11, 12 and 13 on the priority list based on revised allocations and updated revenue projections.
- 2. Determine the funding status of the NE Pool project (#22), and if approved for funding, direct the City Manager to draft an agreement with pool advocates.



Recommendations (continued)

- 3. Approve set-aside of \$1,150,000 to address reoccurring operating expenses for new surtax funded capital projects for a 5-year period.
- 4. Direct staff to return to the City Commission by August 20, 2009 to provide an update on:
 - discussions with the Cone Park Track/Multi-Purpose Fields advocacy group;
 - 2. an evaluation of the costs to replace the fencing at Lincoln Park; and
 - 3. to seek funding approval for any additional projects based on estimated remaining funds and updated projected revenues.
