The MPU is in currently housed at the Alachua Conservation Trust, 7204 CR 234. The cost associated with this service is \$350 per horse for an annual expense of \$16,800. This includes the feeding/stabling of the horses and the maintenance of the pastures/barn.

4120 Contractual Services

This year Spring Hill Veterinary has offered a special heath program which costs approximately \$475 per horse per year for a total of \$1900. This would include routine checkups with vaccinations, dental work, & blood work for health certificates. Prepurchase/lease exams, x-ray, and other incidental well-horse requirements would be an additional charge. However, because emergency vet bills can be expensive, the unit maintains an emergency vet buffer of \$3,000.

Farrier services will be paid at \$225 per horse per shoeing. The horses were switched to traditional horse shoes for several reasons, primarily the wellness of the horses. New replacement horses will be wearing the Easyboots until their reliability on patrol has been established. The optimal trimming/shoeing schedule would be every six (6) weeks resulting in a maximum of \$10,800 for the fiscal year.

We have obtained Horse illness insurance for each horse through Jerry Parks Insurance Group. The insurance premium costs about \$238 per horse for a year totaling \$952. It will also cover injuries, illness and even death.

3010 Materials / Supplies

Historically, this budget item, one of the larger expenses for the MPU, has been underestimated resulting in deficit spending. Every effort has been made to accurately estimate the actual expenses in this category.

The majority of funding is used for Feed, Supplements, Uniforms and Tack, which wears out, with use. It is also used to maintain the stables, pastures, and equipment. Riding pants, boots and helmets also come from this budget item.

<u>3210 Training</u> <u>\$4,200</u>

The training of the unit is one of the most fundamental components to keep the horses and riders proficient in our profession. It is desirable to attend outside training seminars to have outside professional critique the partnership of horse and rider. The experience of traveling and training with other local agencies is invaluable. Networking with other individuals allows us to develop new ideas about the utilization of the Mounted Unit. Local agencies usually hold special joint training events, which are free to attend. However, there is travel and lodging costs involved. With this in mind, \$4,200 has been budgeted to cover Equine related seminars for all members of the Unit.

<u>\$5,000</u>

The only item is \$5,000 for a replacement horse. This is requested to be in place in the event of an unexpected injury, death or exigent retirement of one of the current horses.

The Mounted Patrol Unit has been maintaining a compliment of 4 patrol ready mounts. This practice has been established to allow for a serviceable horse being deployed in the event of an injury or sudden retirement of a horse. During the last 2 years, there have been several instances when at least 2 of the 4 horses have been out of service for several weeks and months due to injury. Had there not been the availability of the additional mounts, the unit would not have been able to deploy and conduct their normal assignments.

The transitional delay is substantially less when additional mounts are available upon a retirement of a horse. One of the fully trained horses is then pressed into full time service. The pretense is much like that of having pool patrol vehicles.

An added benefit to having the 4 patrol ready horses is that during such events as the National Championship celebrations, it allows for the deployment of 4 Mounted Patrol Teams; as we have several department members that would be able to be added to the unit for the event.

The Mounted Patrol Unit is currently being housed at Alachua Conservation Trust. The facility is completely secure and suits our needs perfectly. The Alachua Conservation Trust is responsible for all the stable maintenance, pasture mowing, and feeding of the horses on the Mounted Unit's days off. These services had been contracted out to several different vendors during our stay at Payne's Prairie which cost us significantly more funding. We made need to repair our fencing that is out there.
