9	WHEREAS, Section 163.3167, Florida Statutes, requires local governments to
10	maintain a comprehensive plan to guide future development and growth; and
11	WHEREAS, Section 163.3177, Florida Statutes, requires local governments to
12	include as part of the comprehensive plan a capital improvements element that considers the
13	need for and the location of public facilities and encourages the efficient use of such
14	facilities; and
15	WHEREAS, Section 163.3177(3)(a), Florida Statutes, requires local governments to
16	maintain in the capital improvements element of the comprehensive plan a 5-year capital
17	improvements schedule that identifies projects necessary to maintain and achieve the adopted
18	levels of service for the 5-year planning period; and
19	WHEREAS, Section 163.3177(3)(b), Florida Statutes, requires local governments to
20	annually review the capital improvements element of the comprehensive plan; and
21	WHEREAS, notice of an update to the 5-Year Schedule of Capital Improvements in
22	the Capital Improvements Element of the City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan was given
23	as required by law and a public hearing was then held by the City Plan Board on June 27,
24	2013; and
25	WHEREAS, notice of an amendment to the Capital Improvements Element of the

1 City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan to correct a policy reference in Policy 1.2.1 was

2 given as required by law and a public hearing was then held by the City Plan Board on

- 3 December 2, 2013; and
- WHEREAS, pursuant to law, an advertisement no less than two columns wide by 10
- 5 inches long was placed in a newspaper of general circulation and provided the public with at
- 6 least seven (7) days' advance notice of the first public hearing (transmittal stage) for this
- ordinance to be held in the City Hall Auditorium located on the first floor of City Hall in the
- 8 City of Gainesville; and
- 9 **WHEREAS,** pursuant to law, after the public hearing at the transmittal stage, the City
- of Gainesville transmitted copies of this proposed amendment to the reviewing agencies and
- any other local government unit or state agency that requested same; and
- WHEREAS, a second advertisement no less than two columns wide by 10 inches
- long was placed in the aforesaid newspaper and provided the public with at least five (5)
- days' advance notice of the second public hearing (adoption stage) for this ordinance to be
- 15 held in the City Hall Auditorium located on the first floor of City Hall in the City of
- 16 Gainesville; and
- WHEREAS, the public hearings were held pursuant to the published notices
- described above at which hearings the parties in interest and all others had an opportunity to
- be and were, in fact, heard; and
- 20 **WHEREAS,** prior to adoption of this ordinance the City Commission has considered
- 21 any written comments received concerning this plan amendment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF

THE CITY OF GAINESVILLE, FLORIDA:

- Section 1. Policy 1.2.1 of the Capital Improvements Element of the City of
- 4 Gainesville Comprehensive Plan is amended as stated below. Except as amended herein, the
- 5 remainder of Objective 1.2 and its Policies remain in full force and effect.
- Policy 1.2.1 The City shall adopt the following LOS standards for public facilities within its jurisdiction as indicated in the below listed elements of its Comprehensive

8 Plan:

- Transportation Mobility: Objective 1.1 and associated policies
- Stormwater: Policy 1.1.1
- Potable Water & Water Supply: Policy 1.1.1 and Policy 1.1.3
- Wastewater: Policy 1.1.2 Recreation: Policy 1.1.1
- 15 Solid Waste: Policy 1.4.1
- Public School Facilities: Policy 2.3.1 2.2.1

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- Section 2. Table 14: 5-Year Schedule of Capital Improvements contained in the
- 19 Capital Improvements Element of the City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan is amended as
- shown in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as if set forth in full.
- Section 3. It is the intent of the City Commission that the provisions of Sections 1
- 22 and 2 of this ordinance shall become and be made a part of the City of Gainesville
- 23 Comprehensive Plan.
- Section 4. Within ten (10) working days of the transmittal (first) hearing, the City
- 25 Manager or designee is authorized and directed to transmit this plan amendment and
- appropriate supporting data and analyses to the reviewing agencies and to any other local
- 27 government or governmental agency that has filed a written request for same with the City.

Within ten (10) working days of the adoption (second) hearing, the City Manager or

2 designee is authorized and directed to transmit this plan amendment and appropriate

supporting data and analyses to the state land planning agency and any other agency or local

government that provided timely comments to the City.

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Section 5. The City Manager or designee is authorized and directed to make the

necessary changes to the City of Gainesville Comprehensive Plan in order to fully implement

this ordinance. The City Manager or designee is authorized to correct any typographical

errors that do not affect the intent of this ordinance.

9 **Section 6.** If any word, phrase, clause, paragraph, section or provision of this

ordinance or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid or

unconstitutional, such finding shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this

ordinance that can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or

application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared severable.

Section 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are to the extent

of such conflict hereby repealed on the effective date of this plan amendment.

Section 8. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon adoption;

however, the effective date of this amendment to the City of Gainesville Comprehensive

Plan, if the amendment is not timely challenged, shall be 31 days after the state land planning

agency notifies the City that the plan amendment package is complete in accordance with

Section 163.3184, F.S. If timely challenged, this amendment shall become effective on the

date the state land planning agency or the Administration Commission enters a final order

determining this adopted amendment	to be in compliance with Chapter 163, F.S.	No
