  - GAIN Investor Pitch ShootOut (Annual contest for best business idea, in October which is Gainesville Entrepreneur Month)
  - Support UF in providing seed funding to local start-ups Request UF to focus on business opportunities which are solving local issues or to prioritize funding to start-ups that support the city's strategic priorities Request UF to provide funding to businesses that mirror the demographics of the city – socio-economic, race, ethnicity, gender, age, etc.
