Florida is Still a Donor State Ranks Dead Last in Federal Grant Funding

he federal government plays an important tools in helping Florida pay for the government services it provides, as federal finds enake up 34 percent of the current state budger. The Florida gas much less from Unde Sun than most states. Even with Florida's relatively low feel of state testing and spending, there are 28 states that receive a larger proportion of roal states growned in federal facility.

Over the years, Florida TaxWatch has produced several reports examining how Florida fares, relative to other states, in receiving grants and aid from the federal government. Consistent with our past research, this new analysis shows Florida continues to receive far less than its fair share of federal grant dollars.

In 1998, Florida ranked 49th³ among the 50 states in terms of federal grants received per capita. A 2011 report showed Florida had increased in relative share of federal aid slightly, rising to 48th. ³

Since Florida TaxWasch began tracking Florida's federal grants in 1996, the state has never ranked higher than 43rd (2003 and 2005).

This new Florida TaxWatch analysis reveals that Florida now ranks last in the nation in per capita federal grants received (FY2014-15).⁶

Florida also fares poorly when grant receipts are viewed relative to federal taxes paid. Relative to its portion of total federal taxes paid, Florida pays \$1.58 in taxes for each dollar returned in aid—the second highest premium in the nation

The fortral government distributed \$617.0 billion in grants unting PX2014-15, and Florida received \$22.8 billion of those grants. The vast majority gos to Florida's state greenment, local governments, and universities. A relatively small amount goes to private organizations (both non-point and for profits outery out a public project or service authoritoted by froferal law. Nearly half (\$10.7) billion of Florida's grant goe to the Florida's Agency for Health Cure Administration, mostly to help florida's Medical mograms.

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FEDERAL ISSUE: Alternative Fuel Tax Incentives

BACKGROUND: HOW IT MAY AFFECT THE CITY: An older transportation authorization bill, known as SAFETEA-LU, provided a tax incentive for natural gas when used as a motor vehicle fuel. The \$0.50 per gallon equivalent incentive, which is provided to businesses, individuals, and tax-exempt entities that sell the fuel, essentially serves as a rebate.

In 2015, the rebate provided \$150,263 to the City, nearly double the previous year. In addition, the City recently dropped its station full price to \$1.17 per gasoline gallon equivalent (GGE) and \$0.98 per GGE for government vehicles, which is the lowest price in Florida and possibly the southeastern United States

The \$0.50 incentive originally expired at the end of Fiscal Year 2009, and has been extended five times, most recently as part of a broad "tax extenders" package passed in December 2015. This extension is for two years, including a retroactive extension for 2015. The incentive expired on December 31, 2016. Various industry organizations will continue to pursue the extension in the 115th Congress.

RECOMMENDED POSITION: Support the retroactive extension of a \$0.50 per gallon equivalent tax incentive for natural gas when used as a motor fuel.
