ECONOMIC VITALITY - Living Wages

— The Problem — The Solution — The Logistics



PROBLEM STATEMENT: The lowest wages paid to employees and professionals who work with the city are below a local living wage standard

History

- Members of the City Commission noted that the lowest wages paid to City Employees were below a living wage and set forth to make changes to address this concern.
- Beginning with the FY17 budget, the City Commission has set forth direction to establish an appropriate living wage for employees of the City of Gainesville. This rate was established at \$12.25 per hour in FY17, with fifty cent annual increases approved in the FY18 budget and FY19 plan. The initial goal for the living wage was \$15.00 and will continue to be discussed with the City Commission.
- An ordinance requiring a living wage for contracts is currently in place for some contracts. The application of the Living Wage for Contractors to all contracts was discussed by the City Commission at the General Policy meeting in July of 2017 and continues to be contemplated.

BIG IDEA: Vitalize the local economy through increased employee wages

Current Status

- The City Commission approved Living Wage increases of fifty cents in each of the fiscal years 2017, 2018 and 2019 resulting in a 2019 Living Wage rate of \$13.25 per hour.
- The Total Rewards study is underway as of May 2018 with information becoming available in the fall of 2018.
 The cost of the study is being shared by General Government and GRU.
- Preliminary discussion about the Living Wage for Contract indicates that additional staffing would be required to implement this initiative with fiscal impacts unknown at this time.

HOUSING VITALITY - Affordable Housing

— The Problem — The Solution — The Logistics



PROBLEM STATEMENT: There is a significant gap in the housing needs and availability throughout Gainesville

History

- In accordance with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) regulations, grantees of certain HUD programs, including Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program and HOME Investment Partnerships Program, are required to adopt an Assessment of Fair Housing Plan for their housing and community development activities.
- In December 2017, the City Commission adopted the City's Assessment of Fair Housing Plan; and directed staff to conduct a coordinated housing summit with participating agencies, including elected officials, for further discussion on how to address affordable housing needs in the community.

BIG IDEA: Vitalize the availability of and dispersion of affordable housing

Current Status

- In July 2018, the City will coordinate with the Florida Housing Coalition to conduct a Housing Forum to identify affordable housing needs, City Commission priorities, goals and potential solutions.
- The Plan should consider fiscal and staffing impacts and identify solutions to address needs prior to implementation beginning in FY2020.

- Following the Housing Summit, begin funding the development of the Housing Plan in FY2019.
- Hire a consultant to develop an action plan based on the results of the Summit.
- In accordance with the Plan goals, begin implementation of the housing initiatives in FY2020.

YOUTH VITALITY - Youth Programs

PROBLEM STATEMENT: There are wide gaps in the availability of positive, enriching activities during out-of-school times

History

- In late 2017 and into early 2018, Parks, Recreation & Cultural Affairs convened a series of meetings to determine the best steps forward on closing the gaps in out-of-school time activities.
- On March 15, 2018 staff presented a report from those meetings as well as a series of recommendations.
- Staff also reported on the Wallace Foundation model as a way to possibly proceed.

Current Status

 Funding and resource support is required to facilitate next steps following the Youth Summit and recommended actions.

- Fund and schedule a follow-up to the Youth Summit, including coordination with the Wallace Foundation.
- Begin planning for a Phoenix out-of-school time initiative that would begin approximately six months from approval.
- Evaluate scope and effectiveness of Reichert House programs.

MOBILITY - Vision Zero

— The Problem — The Solution — The Logistics



PROBLEM STATEMENT: Technology and shifting demands draw into question the future of mobility in Gainesville and our approach to designing a transportation system for the next 3-20 years.

History

- The City Manager decided to establish the Department of Mobility in late 2017 and stand it up at the beginning of FY19.
- The City will soon be hiring a Director of Mobility to lead the new department which will include RTS, parking, transportation planning, traffic operations as well as pedestrian and bike initiatives such as Vision Zero.
- Vision Zero is an international initiative intended to eliminate vehicular injuries/deaths, particularly for pedestrians and cyclists.
- The most recent Vision Zero briefing to the General Policy Committee occurred on April 12th, 2018.

- We are progressing towards hiring a Director of Mobility.
- The Department of Mobility will take the lead on further developing the Vision Zero program, coordinating with GPD.

OBJECTIVES: FY2019 Plan

- Identify performance metrics necessary for the program
- Identify costs associated for a local Vision Zero implementation plan
- Vision Zero currently has some staff resources allocated and could continue in FY19 without additional resources. However, to accelerate the development of the plan and prepare for deployment in FY20, some resources could be added in FY19 to begin building staff capacity.
- The Department of Mobility is being established using existing positions and funds.

PRESERVATION - Zero Waste

PROBLEM STATEMENT: How do we design a waste management system for the City that reduces, diverts and recycles our waste?

History

- Zero Waste has been discussed at the General Policy Committee and City Commission.
- City staff have met with County staff and reached a consensus that we will work together and joint fund a Zero Waste initiative if staff is directed by the Commission.
- Staff have conveyed that Strategic Plan is needed as well as a Waste Composition Study. Implementation of a Plan would require addition of one FTE and reclassification/redefinition of an existing position.

BIG IDEA: Establish a Zero Waste Program modeled on best practices from around the country

Current Status

- Organize/Schedule Community Workshops
- A waste composition study could possibly begin before the beginning of FY19
- A Zero Waste Strategic Plan could begin once a consultant is selected

PROBLEM STATEMENT: Broadband and connectivity options in the City of Gainesville are insufficient

History

- At the direction of the Broadband subcommittee, staff from GRU and general government have developed an ITN to explore pathways for making broadband faster, cheaper, and more accessible.
- Staff have engaged in conversations with UF regarding the expansion of the UF's Eduroam Wi-Fi network into priority areas. As part of this expansion residents would also be able to access free Wi-Fi in specific zones. A very early estimate for bandwidth is included above.
- Responses to the Broadband ITN were due by April 23rd.

PROBLEM STATEMENT: The city faces recurring, legacy challenges and issues, which need collaboration and innovation to drive lasting change

History

- A recurring theme heard from citizens, business leaders, and the community throughout the city and UF's respective strategic plan outreach efforts was the need for greater connectivity to support mutual success.
- At the annual State of the City address on February 14, 2017, Mayor Poe and UF President Fuchs signed a Memorandum of Understanding to formalize a collaborative partnership to support implementing our respective strategic plans.
- Both plans align around a vision of Gainesville defining and becoming the New American City and critical to success is working together to envision and plan creative new ways to solve problems.

BIG IDEA: Foster a lasting cross-disciplinary partnership with the University of Florida

Current Status

 Since early 2017, staff regularly meets with UF representatives to construct and build components of the Civic Innovation System in order to leverage partnerships to design solutions for our greatest challenges.

Collaborative Planning:

- UF awarded more than \$300,000 in grants to fund research in April 2017 that utilized the UF campus and greater Gainesville community as a living laboratory to address real-world problems in the local community.
- A proposed governance structure to support the partnership was presented to GPC in October 2017.

BIG IDEA: Foster a lasting cross-disciplinary partnership with the University of Florida

Current Status, cont.

Volunteer Corps:

- In January 2017, the city joined the national non-profit, Cities of Service coalition, to provide support and resources for leveraging volunteers for solving community issues.
- The city is preparing to launch in summer 2018 an online volunteer portal to better connect area organizations and volunteers with local challenges.

Fellowship Programs:

- In spring 2017, the city began partnering with leaders and staff of the Bob Graham Center at UF to develop a fellowship program model for selecting the university's top talent and immersing them into local government.
- The inaugural cohort of 4 is concluding a year of dedicated service as a design team providing unique skills in areas of digital services, research and prototyping, communications and engagement, and visual design.
- A new cohort has been selected to begin working in August 2018.

Smart Cities Lab:

- City Manager appointed member of Smart Cities Advisory Board
- Sponsor of ACIS Smart University Town Conference, panelist
- Autonomous vehicle shuttle project
- In August 2017, the Commission supported a general framework for how we approach smart city work.
- Joined MetroLab
- Smart Cities Collaborative

Staff is actively engaged with UF to identify a co-working space to facilitate partnership efforts, which could also house the smart city lab.
