Wild Spaces & Public Places History

• November 15, 2012 – PRCA Vision 2020 Master Plan approved by City Commission

• February 18, 2016 – City Commission approved a list of 99 potential WSPP projects and a list of potential City/County projects

• November 8, 2016 – Ballot initiative for WSPP approved by voters to *acquire and improve environmentally* sensitive lands to protect drinking water sources, water quality, and wildlife habitat, and; to create, improve and maintain parks and recreational facilities

January 1, 2017 – 8 year long ½ cent sales tax collection begins, ~\$5,808,000 per year, ~\$46.5M for Gainesville
April 20, 2017 – City Commission approved WSPP projects for 2017

• April 20, 2017 and September 14, 2017 – City executed interlocal agreements with the County for \$3,000,000 for specific projects that have county-wide impact and \$660,000 from the County's WSPP Municipal Grant Program

• September 28, 2017 – General Policy Committee received a presentation from PRCA with updates on 2017 projects and proposed projects for 2018

• April 12, 2018 – General Policy Committee received a presentation on WSPP 2018-2020 projects

- January 10, 2019 General Policy Committee received a presentation on WSPP 2018-2020 projects
- April 11, 2019 General Policy Committee received a presentation on WSPP 2018-2020 projects





Howard Bishop Middle School Operation & Maintenance

- $^{\circ}$ City Staff is working with the SBAC on a formal agreement
- Howard Bishop Middle School staff have verbally agreed to maintain the fields and empty trash/recycling containers on the portion of the property that would be designated for public use after school hours and on the weekends
- ° City O&M costs would be negligible if this agreement is formalized


Springtree Park Neighborhood Park Revitalization 2700 NW 39th Avenue




Sweetwater Wetlands Park Prairie Tower and Solar Tower





Project Timeline

April 20, 2017 and September 14, 2017 – City executes interlocal agreements with the County for \$3,000,000 for specific projects that have county-wide impact and \$660,000 from the County's WSPP Municipal Grant Program

• Sweetwater Wetlands Park is part of the \$3M interlocal agreement

• The Prairie Tower is part of the \$660K Municipal Grant Program (50% of the Prairie Tower cost was estimated to be \$225,000)

April, 2018 – City Commission approves \$1.2M of WSPP Funds for SWP Tower Project

November, 2018 - May, 2019 - Project design and permitting

May – June, 2019 – The project is bid (utilizing Wharton-Smith as a Construction Manager at Risk under the City's continuing services agreement for projects <\$2M)

Bidding Results (June, 2019)

Solar + Prairie Tower: \$3M

Solar Tower (only): \$2.44M

Prairie Tower (only): \$.98M

City's Current Construction Budget: \$1.2M+\$.225M (grant funding for the Prairie Tower) +~\$.5M (from the \$3M interlocal agreement)

Total Budget: ~\$1.8M (takes into account design/permitting services)

Next Steps


Option 1 – Rebid the complete project (low bid or CMAR RFP for >\$2M), increase the project budget by approximately \$1.2M using unappropriated WSPP funds

Option 2 – Rebid only the Solar Tower (low bid or CMAR RFP for >\$2M), increase the project budget by approximately \$.9M using unappropriated WSPP funds

Option 3 – Rebid only the Prairie Tower (low bid or CMAR) and add a paved multiuse trail into the project

Option 4 – Rebid only the Prairie Tower

Option 5 – Delay project until the later years of WSPP
