Ordinance Recommendations



Definition

Solid wastes containing carbon compounds that are capable of being biologically degraded, including paper, food residuals, wood wastes, yard debris and plant wastes but not metals, glass or plastic.

Food Waste/Organics Diversion and Composting

Language allows for Infrastructure Development

Who is Covered Initially:

Beginning January 1, 2022 or such a later date as designated by the city manager or designee all commercial generators that regularly generate more than one cubic yard of organic waste per week shall divert them from the waste stream. All restaurants, food processors, and grocery stores shall be assumed to be required to meet this requirement unless capable of documenting otherwise.

Food Waste/Organics Diversion and Composting



Hierarchy Provision

Commercial generators of organic materials are encouraged to follow the hierarchy of beneficial use of scrap food which beginning with the most beneficial is:

- 1) Feed Hungry People
- 2) Feed Animals
- 3) Provide for Industrial Uses
- 4) Compost

Food Waste Curbside

Dates for Implementation

The City shall implement curbside food waste collection in the fiscal years below provided infrastructure and funding is available:

- FY 21 & 22 Pilot program to approximately 200 homes
- FY 23 Expand service to additional
 2,500 single-family homes
- FY 25 Provide/offer service city-wide to single-family homes

Food Waste

Multi-Family Properties



Beginning in Fiscal Year 2023, the City shall implement pilot composting programs at Multi-Family Properties to determine the viability, best practices and effectiveness of food waste composting.

The City Commission shall decide the appropriate direction of the programs by January 1, 2025.
