Best Practices/ Research Findings

- Definition of wellbeing developed by public health researchers John Wiseman and Kathleen Brasher:
 - *"Community wellbeing is the combination of social, economic, environmental, cultural, and political conditions identified by individuals and their communities as essential for them to flourish and fulfill their potential."*
- No standard community wellbeing index that is universally used
- After extensive research, three options explored:
 - University of Minnesota Center for Spirituality & Healing
 - City of Santa Monica, California
 - Gallup/Sharecare Community Wellbeing Index

University of Minnesota Center for Spirituality & Healing



- Wellbeing Model
- Identifies six dimensions that contribute to wellbeing:
 - Health
 - Relationships
 - Security
 - Purpose
 - Community
 - Environment
- Takes into account our interconnectedness and interdependence with our friends, families, and communities, as well as the personal and global environment we live in. It addresses the importance of security and purpose in our lives
- This model is conceptual and would need to be customized

City of Santa Monica Community Wellbeing Index

- Established custom community wellbeing index in 2017 in partnership with RAND Corporation utilizing \$1,000,000 grant from Bloomberg Philanthropies
- Provides a baseline for understanding what contributes to wellbeing and how the city and community can work to improve it.
- Combines existing data, determines what new types of data needed, and integrates all of the available information. It brings together a variety of data from City measures, an extensive resident wellbeing survey and social media in six distinct yet connected categories of what research shows drives wellbeing
- RAND Corporation developed, conducted and analyzed survey
- Utilizes GARE framework
- Vision to help other cities replicate process and build an index specific for each community
- Community Wellbeing office no longer funded by City. Operates as a non-profit organization

Gallup/ Sharecare Community Wellbeing Index

- In conjunction with Boston University's School of Public Health
- 2019 report measures states, 383 metro areas and 99.9% of counties
- Resource intensive, ongoing surveys, with each iteration refining the model
- Conducted since 2008 (over 3M surveys conducted)

Purpose/ Benefits of a Community Wellbeing Index

- Municipalities have always worked to provide essential services to their neighbors, a focus on community wellbeing takes that to another level
- Government leaders are reimagining their obligation and role as government—is it simply for government to uphold the safety net or to more proactively invest in and support the wellbeing of its residents?
- Putting wellbeing at the heart of local policymaking, urban planning, and resource allocation is key to helping communities thrive. But wellbeing is difficult to measure. And few efforts have measured wellbeing and integrated those results into policies and programs.
- What are our concerns?

Summary

- No standard community wellbeing index that is universally used
- Measuring community wellbeing and focusing on efforts to help the community thrive brings long-term benefits for all neighbors
- Close connection to equity efforts
- Difficult, costly and labor intensive to measure
- Once measured, commitment must be there to ensure strategies, budget dollars, policies and programs are aligned to support efforts

Options/ Request for Direction

1. Create a custom community wellbeing index for Gainesville, modeled after the City of Santa Monica, with a plan to monitor and implement programs to address shortcomings
2. Utilize the existing Gallup/Sharecare rankings and focus on development and implementation of programs to address shortcomings and increase ranking
3. Other?
