Alachua County	Quarterly	We use our AHAC as a Citizens Advisory Task Force for CDBG. We also review any new updates to County (PLANS) that may affect housing and make recommendations.
Marion County	Quarterly	Not at this time
Tallahassee	Prior to the passing of HB1339 last year, our AHAC met every 3 years in preparation of drafting a report of recommendations for our LHAP. Beginning this year, our AHAC will meet annually, at least once, with an annual joint AHAC meeting with our county municipality's AHAC.	None.
Lakeland	The City of Lakeland has an Affordable Housing Advisory Committee. The committee meets every 4 th Thursday of March, June, September and December.	In addition to Incentive Report, the committee reviews and comments on all revised or new affordable housing plans (HUD Action Plan and State LHAP) and policies (e.g. new strategies, change in down payment assistance). The Committee has review and rated public services applications for CDBG and other local programs.
Ocala	Once per year.	None.

Summary of other Jurisdictions:

1. They meet less often than the Gainesville AHAC;
2. For three of the Five AHACs, developing the IRR is the only duty;
3. For the other two AHACs, in addition to developing the IRR, they review other plans other plans that could impact affordable housing or funding for affordable housing (e.g., the Comprehensive Plan, the Local Housing Assistance Plan, the HUD Annual Action Plan). They also perform an advisory function for CDBG funds. That function is similar to the role of the City of Gainesville's Citizen Advisory Committee for Community Development (CACCD).
