RECOMMENDATION Continue discussion of the IRP with consideration of the Commission's feedback.

This item was heard after Item #210031.

Discussion among members included:

Include a scenario in 2022 IRP to have 100% renewable by 2030?

Enhance Demand side management – IRP include required periodic self-rating from GRU

Environmental impacts of climate change – lifecycle cost of fuels – include in IRP – each scenario should include a carbon impact

Ensure adequate back-up capacity for reliability – would like to see some discussion of including local renewables as source of reliability

Board members agreed that they should continue working on achievable, measurable timeline goals for obtaining 100% renewable by 2045 and stated

that these goals be included in the final policy plan and in the 2022 IRP base scenario.

Board members recommended that the 2022 IRP include a required periodic self-rating from GRU based on the same metrics discussed in the recent ACEEE report "Unrealized Potential" so that we can see how GRU stacks up against other FL utilities with regard to its efficiency efforts. Also, staff should use total resource costs tests for evaluating energy efficiency, as used in states outside of Florida, rather than relying on the ratepayer impact measures currently in use here.

Board members asked that staff report to the UAB and City Commission on the Commission's motions on how GRU might discontinue fossil gas rebates and that staff revisit and possibly reconsider how it is marketing fossil gas as clean energy as soon as practicable.

Board members recommended that the 2022 IRP couch future planning within the context of climate projections over the next 20 years, cumulative carbon emissions, & projected impacts of climate change on this community. These discussions should also include, to the extent practicable, the complete life-cycle costs of the fuels GRU uses, rather than simply the "tailpipe emissions."

Board members agreed that the 2022 IRP should include a discussion on how locally produced renewable energy should be considered a fundamental underpinning of resilient and available local supply when other fuel source deliveries are interrupted.
