Repurpose Project

Wages Higher than Retail

- 75%+ Goes to Wages
- Increasing Revenue and Positions Each Year
- Significant Amount of Business From Out of Area
- Provides a Source of Goods for Low Income
- Provides Materials for DYI and Repair Community
- Educates Community on Value of Reuse

Challenges



Supply Greater Than Demand

- Appliances, Furniture, and Other Similar Items Get Landfilled
- Quality Material is Placed at Curb or Taken to Alachua Transfer Station
- Clothing Fiber May be Exported or Donated to International Charities

Challenges

Difficult Materials Not Getting Reused/Recycled

- Large Items that People Can't Transport
- Items that Don't Display or Fit Well in a Traditional Thrift Store
- Items that are of Lower Value but Still Useful
- Small Quantities of Material

Solutions

Difficult to Reuse/Recycle Materials

- Center for Hard to Recycle Materials
- Creative Reuse Centers
- Construction Project Materials-Processing
 and Retail Facility

Solutions

Center for Hard to Recycle Materials (CHaRM)

- Zero Waste Plan Will Recommend Feasibility Study
- Takes Furniture, Mattresses, Appliances, Non-Program Recyclables
- Maybe in Good Condition or Need Repair
- Acts as a Clearinghouse for Material

Solutions

Increase Infrastructure

- Warehousing Ability
- Larger Facilities
- Increase Collection Abilities
- Delivery Service

Solutions

Change Business Model of Reuse

- Co-Location (e.g. New Car Dealerships, Strip Mall)
- Market Segmentation (e.g. price points, specialty, mass marketer)

Education

Solutions

- Public Not Always Aware of What is Valuable or Not Valuable
- High Quality of Materials are Available at Reuse Stores
- Environmental and Economic Value

Student Move Outs (2 x year)

- Quality Materials
- Large Volume Short Period
- Storage Issues
- Landlords Focused on Prepping and Renting
- Significant Coordination Necessary

Student Move Out Pilot

Gainesville Specific

- COVID prevented 2020 Pilot
- City Staff to Work with UF, SFC, WCA, and Non-Profits Next Year



C&D Reuse



Repurpose Project:

- Only Facility in Area that Sells Deconstructed Demolition Debris
- City Ordinance Could Create Capacity
 Issues
- One of a Few Reuse Centers that is not Funded with Government Assistance
- Current Location Does Not Have Adequate Processing Capabilities (e.g. Nail Removal from Boards)
